20	DIRECT EXAMINATION		
21	BY MR. ESCOBAR:		
22	Q. Good afternoon, Mr. Silis.		
23	A. Good afternoon.		
24	Q. Mr. Silis, could you please state your full		
25	name for the record and if you could spell your last		

name, that would be good for the court reporter.

- A. John P. Silis, S-I-L-I-S.
- Q. Mr. Silis, what is your occupation?
- A. Owner of Innovative Surveillance, LLC.
- Q. What is Innovative Surveillance? What type of company is that?
 - A. We maintain -- install, maintain, repair video surveillance systems.
 - Q. Is the Cobb Theater one of your clients?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. I'm going to direct your attention to the afternoon of January 13th of 2014 and ask you if you received a phone call from the Cobb administrative offices at your office there. I believe you live or your office is down in the southern part of Florida?
 - A. In Melbourne.
- Q. In Melbourne, did you receive a phone call from the Cobb Theater administration?
 - A. I did.
 - Q. Do you know about what time that was?
- A. It was sometime in the afternoon. I really can't specify the time. Late afternoon, I'm thinking.
- Q. Were you requested to perform some duty for them?
- 25 A. Yes.

Q. And what was that duty that you were requested to perform?

A. To remove all the hard drives from all the

- recorders.
 - Q. From where?

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- A. At the movie theater in the Grove.
- Q. And when did they want you to do that?
- A. As soon as possible.
- O. What did that mean?
- A. Now, basically. As soon as I could get there.
- Q. So they wanted you to immediately go to the Cobb Theater and remove the hard drive from their surveillance system?
- 14 A. Correct.
- Q. Did they tell you that they wanted you to do anything else?
 - A. They wanted me to personally package them and deliver them to their corporate office in Birmingham.
 - Q. That day?
 - A. That day.
 - Q. Please tell the Court what you did that day pursuant to those instructions.
- MR. MARTIN: Your Honor, at this time, the
 State has an objection to the entire line of
 questioning to Mr. Silis. I waited for the

objection until the Court could get a feel for exactly where we're going with this.

My objection is relevancy under 402.

Specifically, Mr. Silis was involved in the handling of the hard drives over a couple-day period.

The reason I bring it up as relevancy is because of the same argument we've made over and over. After the shooting and exactly what either Cobb Theater or the police officers did or did not do with the hard drives is not relevant to this hearing.

This hearing, as we've said over and over, and I know I'm repeating myself, but for the record, is that we are here on an immunity hearing, and in this particular case as the fact finder, it is your responsibility and obligation to determine prior to law enforcement getting involved whether or not the conduct of Mr. Reeves was reasonable.

So anything that the Defense may or may not like about how the police conducted the investigation has no bearing on your determination as to whether or not it was reasonable because this Court is well aware that the Court only looks at what Mr. Reeves knew, what was in his head, what were the circumstances prior to law enforcement

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getting there.

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The other thing, Judge, as far as not relevant, we have already stipulated to the chain of custody and the authenticity of all of the surveillance tapes, so with the stipulation and the chain of custody and the fact that it's not relevant for the immunity hearing, what Mr. John Silis did at the direction of Cobb, what the officers did in securing the hard drive is not relevant. It may be relevant at a trial, but that's not where we are at now.

And I know the Court -- I know you're the fact finder and you can hear it and you have to hear it to make a ruling, but the bottom line is this hearing is being extended far beyond what was anticipated.

Now, it's encroaching on my time, and so if we're going to go down all this police investigation, we may as well set aside another week because we're not going to get done, so I have a relevancy on two issues.

Thank you, Judge.

THE COURT: Thank you, Mr. Martin.

Response?

MR. ESCOBAR: Your Honor, I certainly respect
Mr. Martin's argument; however, I would tell the

Court respectfully that he is 100 percent wrong in this particular case, and let me tell you why:

What he wants you to do is just to consider in a vacuum what the witnesses that were in the theater, at that time in a darkened theater, let's not forget in a darkened theater, in a theater that had previews that were blaring, that's all he wants you to consider.

The problem is that, in addition to considering that, he's going to be introducing evidence from his law enforcement officers that went into that theater after the incident, secured evidence, supposedly correctly, retrieved evidence and are going to be introducing evidence for you to consider in this particular case.

This is not a pre-January 13, 2014, 2:00 investigation. This investigation stemmed throughout the entire period of time, and there's going to be a Detective Aaron Smith that's going to be testifying before the Court.

His responsibility was the crime scene detective, and any time you have an investigation, this Court has to evaluate the competency of every witness, the ability of every witness to properly evaluate what they're seeing and then respond in

this Court as to whether it's contaminated, whether it's not contaminated, because you're going to be making a judgment throughout all of the witnesses on credibility.

So this is not, "Hey, by the way. The shooting happened on January 13, 2014, at 1:27, and, listen, let's forget about everything else of the investigation."

I know why they don't want you to focus on the investigation, because I intend, by the end of this hearing, to show this Court that this investigation was nothing short of a disaster, and that's our position.

This witness will be testifying that the Cobb

Theater had him go out immediately to get those hard
drives. There was a police officer standing guard
at that theater. He tells the police officer, "I'm
coming in to take the hard drives."

He goes in, grabs the hard drives, takes the hard drives. That's the kind of security that took place at the Cobb Theater. He doesn't want that to come in, but it's highly relevant.

MR. MARTIN: Judge, may I respond?

THE COURT: You may.

MR. MARTIN: Mr. Escobar just made my argument

even more clear. The investigation was a disaster.

Aaron Smith had responsibilities with the hard

drives.

If Mr. Escobar wanted to make that type of argument, he shouldn't have entered into the stipulation.

We have already stipulated that the hard drives, regardless of how they were obtained, are authentic, and the experts can do their work off of those hard drives. It doesn't make any difference about what they knew about the arrest.

This isn't a Motion to Suppress. This is an immunity hearing to determine whether or not Mr. Reeves' conduct was reasonable when he shot Mr. Oulson, and it has nothing to do with the police investigation.

Now, the State is aware that the Court has allowed the testimony regarding whether or not there was witness contamination, and that kind of makes sense, Judge, because you're going to have witnesses coming in and you get to judge their credibility, because some of those facts, you're going to be making a determination of whether or not Mr. Reeves' conduct was reasonable, so that makes sense that he would want to show and shed some light on whether or

not there was contamination, but the whole rest of it, when we're talking about Mr. Silis coming in and what he was going to do with the hard drives, where they were going to go, it has nothing to do with your determination whatsoever.

This is not a Motion to Suppress. It's not a motion to suppress evidence. It's an immunity hearing that they have the burden, and they have the burden to prove with evidence that's available. They can't prove by a negative. They can't say, "This didn't exist; therefore, you've got to show that his actions were reasonable."

That's not the way it works. He stands in the shoes of a prosecutor now. Now he know how it feels to stand there as a prosecutor and not have something that he doesn't want. It's his burden.

So I would explain to the Court that we have an immunity hearing that's separate and distinct. The rules apply, and it's not relevant at all as to what happened as far as the investigation, attacking the investigation.

Did the cops keep sloppy crime logs? Did they secure the evidence correctly? We have stipulated to everything that was collected. It's coming into evidence. If he didn't want that stipulation, he

didn't have to do it. He stipulated to all of the evidence that he says was a disastrous investigation.

That's the only way that it becomes relevant, if he's trying to keep some of the evidence out that was collected at the scene. We've stipulated to it. You signed it, so that's why I'm saying now it is not relevant, and Mr. Silis' testimony is not relevant.

MR. ESCOBAR: Judge, first of all, let me -- if I can give the Court a copy of the stipulation that Mr. Martin and I entered into so that -- may I approach, Your Honor?

THE COURT: Sure.

MR. ESCOBAR: Your Honor, you will see that right after the parentheses two little i's, that we reserved not only issues of relevancy, but we reserved all other issues that were going to be important in this case.

And I tend to disagree again with Mr. Martin.

This is not just about the hard drives. This is about the entire control of the scene by Detective Smith, Detective Proctor and others, and so it doesn't work out where, if we're bringing in Mr. Silis concerning the lack of control with the

hard drives that the Court shouldn't consider the lack of control with the hard drives, with a lack of control of everything else.

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It's circumstantial evidence to show that the second in command in this particular case, being Detective Aaron Smith, and the first in command as a homicide detective, failed to do certain things to give this Court some comfort in what is being introduced into evidence and what is being -- the testimony that's being provided in this particular case.

We can't take this case in isolation. I know that's what they want to do, but we can't take it because we've got someone's life in our hands, and he has absolutely every right.

I think the Court knows the body of law concerning the Defense actually providing cross-examination and evidence in a case like this. There is wide, wide latitude because of our Constitutional rights in these matters, and so I would tell the Court it is extremely relevant.

This witness is going to be very short because he's going to testify about the fact that he came, pulled those hard drives and was not about to go to Alabama himself, turned it over to somebody else and

he left.

Of course, later on he's also going to testify about the fact that he changed the entire system, all brand-new DVRs and everything for the Cobb Theater. Those are relevant issues, and he wants to pick it apart and say: No, no, no, no. Let's just talk about whoever was there, whoever was there even though they've been contaminated, even though law enforcement improperly secured the scene. Even though law enforcement didn't interview them correctly, most of these witnesses had three, four, five-minute interviews.

You've heard from a plethora of witnesses already concerning the contamination. Tom Peck just testified there was 40 people out there talking to each other. But did you hear any police officers telling them, "Do not say anything"? Absolutely not. There's going to be a series of witnesses, one after another that are going to tell you that.

So is this relevant? It's highly relevant.

It's to show that this investigation had no control.

There was an officer right there at the door, and they let this gentleman that they didn't know from Adam to come in, go to the particular hard drives and start pulling, not 10, but 15 hard drives from

that system, and he doesn't want anybody to know.

THE COURT: All right. Once again, we probably have spent far more time arguing about this issue than this witness would probably testify. I certainly understand the State's argument, but in the grand scheme of things I'm the trier of fact. I know the law. I know what's relevant and what's not, and if -- I'd rather be safe than sorry, so I'm going to allow it rather than exclude it.

MR. ESCOBAR: Thank you, Your Honor.

THE COURT: So let's get on with it.

BY MR. ESCOBAR:

- Q. Now, Mr. Silis, you went to the Cobb Theater; is that correct?
 - A. That's correct.
- Q. Who was outside, present at the Cobb theater controlling that scene?
- A. The theater was roped off. There was an officer by the end of the parking lot asking -- you know, he was going to just have me turn around, but I told him, "Here," you know, because I was told by Cobb to remove evidence, and he let me in and I talked to the Cobb rep on site.
 - Q. Did you show that officer your ID?
 - A. He didn't request one, but --

1 Q. Okay.

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- He would know who I was anyway. Α.
 - So you entered -- you entered that crime scene, Q. and tell the Court where you went.
- Α. Right up to the upstairs where they have all the DVRs in a little server room.
 - 0. Who went upstairs with you?
 - Α. One of the theater managers.
 - Q. Any law enforcement officers went with you?
- 10 I do not think so. Α.
 - Q. So what did you do up there in that room?
 - Basically just opened up all the computer Α. cabinets, took out the hard drives, packaged them up and prepared them for shipment, and they told me that someone from Cobb was going to be here in a short time to get them.
 - So now Cobb didn't have any surveillance 0. equipment for the next day?
 - Correct, but they were closed, I'm assuming. Α.
 - What about the next day? 0.
 - I don't know how long they were closed. Α.
- Q. Well, at some point in time you provided them 23 with a loaner; is that correct?
- 24 Α. Yeah, a loaner.
 - Q. Do you know how many days after you provided

1 them with a loaner or loaners? 2 Only a couple. It was within the same week, 3 like two or three days. 4 Q. And did you also then finally remove all of the 5 DVRs and replace the entire system? 6 Α. Eventually, but that was a couple weeks later. 7 0. Okay. What happened to the DVRs? 8 Α. The empty ones? 9 Yeah. **Q**. 10 That I'm not really sure. I think -- sometimes Α. 11 I service all the theaters throughout Florida, sometimes 12 we use the same cabinet, sometimes not. 13 I can't recall if I -- I believe I replaced 14 everything with all new cabinets and the entire setup, 15 basically. 16 MR. ESCOBAR: No further questions. 17 THE COURT: Cross. 18 CROSS-EXAMINATION 19 BY MR. MARTIN: Mr. Silis, Cobb Theater calls you because 20 21 you've built those systems, right? 22 Α. Not those particular ones. I maintain them, but I built all the new ones. 23 24 And the ones that you eventually replaced you Q.

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built?

1 Α. Correct. 2 Q. And that was the reason that they called you is 3 your familiarity with the particular equipment, right? 4 Α. Right. They have other vendors, too, but 5 hopefully I'm their favorite. 6 Now, the particular equipment that's in the 7 room that you've described on direct examination, Mr. 8 Escobar kept referring to it as a DVR? 9 Α. Right. 10 Is that the correct terminology? Q. 11 Α. Yes. 12 How many hard drives are in each DVR? Q. Each DVR at Cobb has three. 13 Α. 14 And the software system, are you familiar with Q. 15 the software system? 16 Α. Yes. 17 And that is GeoVision? Ο. 18 GeoVision with Microsoft Windows. Α. 19 Is GeoVision kind of a standard in the industry 0. 20 as far as your industry --21 MR. ESCOBAR: Beyond the scope of direct, Your 22 Honor. 23 He opened the door about this. MR. MARTIN: 24 MR. ESCOBAR: No, it's beyond the scope of

direct, because the only thing that I dealt with was

the removal of the hard drives from a time after the incident, and I didn't get into any of the mechanics of the system.

If he wants to call Mr. Silis back up on his direct and do so, then he can, but it's beyond the scope.

THE COURT: Response?

MR. MARTIN: He opened the door by indicating that he had to replace things, and so replacing things means he has to reset it up and had to have a working knowledge to get it back working. That's what Mr. Escobar asked: How long -- what did it take for you to get it back working?

I have a right to explore how he got it back working, not only by installation of a hard drive, by the -- I can't even say the word -- by resetting the software that's in it and knowing how to reset it and what he had to do. I have a right to go into that now.

MR. ESCOBAR: Judge, he didn't do anything with the system that he took the hard drives out of. He replaced the entire system. The only thing that he did was take out the 15 hard drives, left the system that was there, came back, gave a loaner, which is a completely different item, and then came back, took

the original system and replaced it with a brand-new system.

If he wants to, I guess, talk about the brand-new system that he put in two weeks later, that would certainly be relevant, but that's about the only thing that he can do because the direct is the direct, and he can't go beyond my direct.

THE COURT: I don't know what your question was.

MR. MARTIN: Could I offer this suggestion to the Court?

Mr. Silis is from Melbourne. You have the power as far as presenting the presentation of evidence. Allow me right now to take him as my witness so that he has -- doesn't have to drive back.

I'm standing here ready to go. Mr. Silis is right there. This would be save for the time for the Court, and you have the authority to allow me to do that if you are so inclined, and that way I'll just ask direct questions and I'll be done in 10 minutes.

MR. ESCOBAR: Judge, if he's going to take him as his witness now, I don't have a problem with that. I don't want to inconvenience Mr. Silis or

1 the Court, but it's going to be his witness now. 2 That's the only thing that I would say. 3 I would still stay with my objection, if he's 4 going to do cross, but if he's going to do now a new direct with Mr. Silis and he wants to take Mr. Silis 5 6 now on that limited area, then I'm okay with it. 7 Now, if he's going to get far afield, then he 8 needs to go into his own case and do it sometime 9 later on, because we've got a flow of information 10 here as well. 11 THE COURT: All right. For a witness that was 12 supposed to be very irrelevant, we're certainly 13 having a lot of questions. I mean, your testimony, 14 Mr. Silis, not you. 15 I didn't even hear your last question or much 16 of it that was supposed to be outside the scope. 17 Was it outside the scope? 18 MR. MARTIN: Can we just move on? 19 Let's do that. And you may call THE COURT: 20 him as your witness, but the rules will apply --21 MR. MARTIN: Absolutely. THE COURT: -- as to whoever called him, so --22 23 MR. MARTIN: Absolutely. 24 THE COURT: -- we'll consider him yours now, so

that means no leading.

 - A. Right now, I'm kind of migrating away from Windows, just using standard DVRs that don't have -- they're all embedded, what we call embedded Linux, which means -- it's just the box that records without worrying about Windows and viruses and updates and all of that stuff.
 - Q. So your preference has changed, not because GeoVision is no longer the standard in the industry; you

just don't like to mess with Windows?

- A. It's still considered the Rolls Royce of surveillance, but with Windows you have a lot more options, but along with that comes a lot more problems, too.
 - Q. All right.

- A. I like to keep things simple.
- Q. All right. With GeoVision, when you set parameters up for a particular client, are you familiar with the GeoVision software so that you can assist your client in setting the system the way they want it?
 - A. Oh, yeah.
- Q. Now, in the event that a client only wants to record things when activity is occurring -- I'm going to use the layman's term as motion sensor, okay?
 - A. Uh-huh.
- Q. Now, when I think of that -- I'm just giving you this example so we can have this discussion. You know, when you buy something from Home Depot and you walk under at your front door and your light comes on, that kind of motion sensor, right?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. Now, with GeoVision and the camera that you used to capture the event taking place with that software, is that the way GeoVision works, like a sensor

1 from Home Depot that you walk under, or does it work in 2 another way? 3 MR. 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The State objected to anything that happened after that particular day, which I still don't agree with; however, now we're talking about before that particular day. However, I think we're getting some background information.

I think it's important for the Court to hear what kind of a father he was, what kind of person he was, and I think if we get the bigger picture, I mean, the State -- I know and I appreciate Mr. Martin's argument that it is a snapshot in time, but truly, Judge, this isn't a snapshot. This is a movie, if you will. This is a long movie regarding his entire life to know who he is, and that's what the law requires, and we have the burden of proving that he was justified and Mr. Reeves was justified, so, therefore, we should be granted some leeway to have the Court understand exactly who Mr. Reeves is.

The rules allow for an accused to THE COURT: put forth testimony regarding his character as long as it pertains to a trait that has something to do with the crime charged.

Where are you getting at with that line of questioning?

> I think Mr. Martin's comment in MR. MICHAELS:

terms of his opening statement/argument was something to the effect of -- and I'm sure he'll correct me if I'm wrong. I apologize if I'm wrong, but the characterization was essentially that Mr. Reeves was a former police officer who didn't get his way, because he's a person that is used to being in authority, and therefore, he overreacted and didn't act properly, therefore, wasn't justified.

So this is relevant to certainly show that that wasn't the type of character. Essentially the testimony would be that he is a guy who left work at work.

So if we're saying that he's a man who left the police force, with the police force upon retirement, then, I think this is relevant to show that that's the bigger picture and that that is relevant to show his character, in terms of he's not as he's being characterized by the State in this case.

THE COURT: Any further argument?

MR. MARTIN: Yes, Judge.

The character evidence that is relevant in an immunity hearing deals with the elements in which -- that are at issue. It's no different than any other type of self-defense case.

Judge, there is no leeway for the Defense. The

only time there's leeway is in a death penalty case, and we've heard it over and over. Death is different from the Courts and we get leeway. This is not where we're at.

I've provided the Court with the case law that indicates that all the rules of evidence apply in this particular case. And so, in this particular case, we're having an immunity hearing, what is relevant are those issues related to a self-defense-type argument, and character related to that might be relevant, if they can link it up.

But right now what Mr. Michaels is asking for, is to put on character evidence to show that in the way, way future he acted in conformity therewith.

That's where we have the problem with linking the evidence, so I still object to this line of questioning.

MR. MICHAELS: The problem that we have, the thing that makes this kind of hearing a little different, is because we're putting the trier of fact in the shoes of Mr. Reeves.

If we're not allowed to have testimony regarding exactly who it is filling those shoes, then it's problematic and he's not, frankly, getting a fair opportunity to present his defense.

THE COURT: All right. As far as leeway goes, the only way I'm going to allow it is testimony that would indicate something to do with whether or not Mr. Reeves was a peaceful man, a patient man, something along those lines, and I gather that's where you were going with that.

MR. MARTIN: Just so that your ruling is clear to the State, we're talking about the proper way to present that reputation within the community and not specific incidents.

THE COURT: No, that's incorrect. The rules allow for an accused to bring that type of testimony.

MR. MARTIN: At a trial.

THE COURT: I'm going to allow it.

MR. MARTIN: Thank you, Judge.

THE COURT: Uh-hum.

BY MR. MICHAELS:

MR. MARTIN: Your Honor, I'm going to object to this line of questioning. Her travel through time and how her own body has changed is not relevant here at all.

MR. MICHAELS: Judge, it is relevant because certainly Mr. Reeves has the right to be justified in defending himself or another, and certainly his wife sitting next to him in a movie theater is somebody that he is justified to protect as well as himself.

Again, it goes to Mr. Reeves' mind set, his perception. If a person who's seventy years old is sitting in a theater and next to them is his elderly wife also sitting in the theater, and that person

has some maladies or weaknesses or some fragility, certainly that's going to color the individual's perception into whether or not he needs to act in a certain way to defend himself and to defend his wife.

THE COURT: All right. I had a question of that early on with the first witness, his character traits being described as one of knowledge of impending frailty or one for peacefulness.

Mr. Michaels?

MR. MICHAELS: I'm sorry, Your Honor.

THE COURT: What character trait are you attempting to elicit from this line of questioning?

MR. MICHAELS: Frailty of both Mr. Reeves and Mrs. Reeves.

THE COURT: Is that character trait, knowledge of impending frailty, that you're --

MR. MICHAELS: Actually, realization, because it is no longer impending. It's here, the realization that on that day, on January 13th of 2014, that she had the realization that she was frail and that her husband had the same realization as he sat next to her in that Cobb Theater.

MR. MARTIN: Judge, as I repeated over and over, the criteria in an immunity hearing is the

knowledge of Mr. Reeves. If Mr. Reeves wants to take the stand and say, "My knowledge of my wife is this, and maybe I did it because of this," that's what we're talking about.

We can't have his wife explain all the ailments he may or may not know she has when it's not relevant to what he knew. The only thing that's relevant is what's in his mind. We can't impute or assume by a witnesses' testifying that I have A, B and C, that he knows it. He has to take the stand and say what was in his own mind, so it's not relevant for Mrs. Reeves to sit there and explain all her ailments in this particular setting.

MR. MICHAELS: I think that we could be secure -- and Mr. Escobar will correct me if I'm wrong -- I'm sure we could be secure in the fact that Mr. Reeves will indeed be testifying at this hearing. There's no question about that.

MR. MARTIN: And that might be true, but his knowledge might be more or less than what we'll hear from the stand.

So what we're doing here, we can't have our cake and eat it, too. If Mr. Reeves is going to testify, great. I'll handle it when Mr. Reeves testifies, but Mrs. Reeves can't say, "I have these

infirmities," and we impute that to Mr. Reeves
because they may change his mind and he may not
testify.

MR. ESCOBAR: I can assure the Court there's no way that I could keep Mr. Reeves off the stand. He will be testifying in this immunity hearing.

THE COURT: All right. That's neither -- that's not for my consideration about this witness anyway.

To the extent that her testimony is -- leads to that sort of character trait, which is -- I'm -- I determined is part of the defense's theory, and in light of the witnesses who have testified already, I'm going to allow it. Overruled.

BY MR. MICHAELS:

- Q. So tell us a little bit, Mrs. Reeves, about how your body and your abilities have diminished over the years from when you were married up until January of 2014.

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- Q. By bleeding easily, give an example to the Court of how he started bleeding.
- 9 A. About -- the last time was about probably a 10 month ago.
 - Q. Well, before -- let's talk about before 2014.
- A. Oh, okay. Just if he sticks himself, like
 picking up limbs or doing anything, he bleeds, and I put
 something called Wound Seal on him.
 - Q. Is that what you use for yourself as well?

- A. When he worked in the yard, he would wear a brace around his middle, and he bought -- when he was at Busch Gardens, he had to walk a lot and he got orthotics, and he bought Ecco shoes, which were much better quality than what he was wearing.
- Q. Was he taking anything over the counter that is usually for pain, that you're aware of?
- 18 A. Yes, he was.
 - Q. What was he taking?
 - A. Ibuprofen.
 - Q. When he was working at Busch Gardens, did he have any treatment on his feet that you're aware of? In other words, did you see any kind of machine that he used?
 - A. Yes, he got several shots, even back then, in

the bottom of his foot, and he used a TENS machine.

- Q. Was he big into any sort of hobbies that you're aware of, like woodworking, metalworking, that sort of thing?
 - A. Yes, he did.
- Q. Tell the Court some of the things that he would do.
- A. He worked with metal and he built two carports, and when we had our property in North Carolina, he put sides onto the little pump house that were metal, and he put together a big metal building, like a barn, and he did woodworking. He's built a lot of things out of wood; swings, banks.
 - Q. How long ago was that?
- 15 A. (No response.)
- 16 Q. It wasn't last year, was it?
- 17 A. No.

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- 18 Q. Was it 10 years ago or more?
- 19 A. Ten or more.
 - Q. What about around the house? Now, after you moved from Lutz, you moved to Brooksville; is that right?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Why did you build such a big house there?
- 24 A. I was hoping for a lot of grandchildren.
- Q. Okay. And if it's a big house, there must be a

lot of upkeep. Who does the upkeep around the house?

- A. My son has to do -- has to help out a lot.
- Q. Now, when you first moved there -- how long have you been there? Let me ask you that first.
 - A. I think twelve years.

- Q. When you first moved there, was your husband able to do a lot of things around the house?
- A. Some. We've got a lot of oak trees, and to clean the gutters requires you to get on the roof because there's -- we don't have a pool but there's a screen cage over the patio, and I think he did that the first year and then he just can't handle getting on the roof, so Matt's our maintenance man now.
- Q. Now, you have a granddaughter who's now five. When your granddaughter was two years old or one year old, would your husband get on the floor and play with her?
- A. Some, yes.
- Q. Did he ever get stuck where you had to go and try and help him out?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. What about your husband working out? Did he at one time work out in a gym?
- A. Yes. His former Medicare insurance policy included Silver Sneakers, so he could go to the gym for

free, and he joined Gold's Gym and he lifted weights and did yoga, but he had to stop.

- Q. Is it true or not that he hurt himself doing yoga?
 - A. Yes, he did.
 - Q. So he's never been back to yoga or the gym?
- A. No.

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- Q. How long ago was that?
- A. Let's see. Maybe eight to 10 years ago.
- Q. True or false: One of the reasons your husband retired from Busch Gardens was because it was difficult for him to be on his feet so much?
- A. True.
- Q. Now, when your husband retired from Tampa

 Police Department, did he ever show any signs whatsoever
 that he missed the action of being a police officer, or
 was he happy to be retired and home with you waiting for
 grandchildren?
- MR. MARTIN: I'm going to object. That calls
 for speculation on her part.
- 21 THE COURT: Yeah, you can rephrase it.

Mr. Michaels to do, and if I could respectfully
request the Court to reminded Mr. Michaels exactly
what the limitations are so I don't have to keep
jumping up and down. I would appreciate it.

THE COURT: I will sustain it to the responsible part.

MR. MICHAELS: To the responsible part?

THE COURT: Yes.

- 18 Q. Okay. So she lives with you now on at least a 19 part-time basis?
- 20 A. Part time.
- Q. Now, let's talk about January 13th of 2014.

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- 23 A. Yes.
- Q. Do you recognize the date?
- 25 A. Yes.

Q. Now, I need you to think back to that day for me.

- A. Okay. Yes.
- Q. You went to a matinee?
- A. Yes.

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- Q. Could you tell me about that? Why did you go to a matinee?
- A. When we went to the movies, we usually went to the matinee. I think it's cheaper, and my son and Curtis had read the book Lone Survivor, and they had come home from an archery hunting trip, and it's just kind of spur of the minute, I think. They wanted to see the movie, and I wanted to go because it was based on a true story.

- Q. Now, once you buy the popcorn and the drink, where do you go?
- 14 A. I go to the restroom.
- Q. Once you come back from the restroom, where do you go?
- 17 A. Into the theater.
- Q. Okay. So you get your drink, you get your popcorn, you go to the restroom and you go into
- 20 | Theater 10?
- 21 A. Yes.
- Q. Tell me what did you do once you get into the theater?
- A. We came around the little wall and people were kind of -- it wasn't full, but people were spread out.

And we were looking for, really, five seats so we could have three and maybe an empty seat beside us.

- Q. Three seats for you, your husband and your son?
- 4 A. Yes.

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- Q. And so you go around the little wall, and where do you look for seats?
 - A. In the upper section.
 - Q. Okay. Do you all spot five seats or something that looks like five seats?
- 10 A. Yes.
- 11 Q. Where was that located?
- 12 A. At the very top row.
- Q. And that's the row that's right next to CineBistro; is that right?
- 15 A. Yes, with a wall behind it.
- Q. So it's the very last row or the very first if
 you're coming back from there? It's the very last row if
 you're looking up?
 - A. If you're looking up, it's the very last row.
- 20 Q. The very first row if you're looking down?
 - A. Yes.
- 22 Q. Who walks down the aisle first?
- 23 A. Curtis.
- Q. Is that the way you would usually walk to your seats?

It's -- we're

1 Probably not. Α. 2 Why did you walk behind Mr. Reeves? Q. 3 Because usually I go in first, but we were Α. 4 going to put me between Curtis and my son. 5 Now, as you walk in, are the previews on yet? 0. 6 Α. No. 7 As you walk in, do you notice anybody using 0. 8 their phone? 9 Α. Yes. 10 And who do you see using their phone? Q. 11 Mr. Oulson had his phone out, and I just saw 12 that the screen was lit. 13 Q. Okay. Now, we're going to talk about what you 14 remember, but let me ask you in terms of how this day, 15 how what happened made you feel, tell the Court 16 emotionally what toll it had on you. 17 Α. I've never been so scared in all my life. 18 MR. MARTIN: Your Honor, I'm going to object. 19 Relevancy. 20 MR. MICHAELS: Judge, it goes to her testimony. 21 We have to look at her testimony in context. 22 Certainly she's telling the Court that she was 23 scared and so, you know, she's going to tell the 24 Court what she remembers. She's telling the Court

how she felt when that day happened.

going to get there one way or another, so we're just kind of framing what her experience was there, and so I think it's relevant that she was fearful.

MR. MARTIN: Your Honor, her demeanor and her feelings at that point are not relevant to any material issue in this immunity hearing at all.

There's nothing for you to consider regarding how she felt --

MR. MICHAELS: Well, here --

MR. MARTIN: -- so I object as far as relevancy for this particular hearing.

MR. MICHAELS: Here's why it's relevant: If we have two people sitting in the theater, one individual is accused of discharging a firearm illegally and he's telling the Court that it was a justified use of his firearm because he was in fear of imminent great bodily harm or death, somebody sitting next to him can certainly -- it's certainly relevant to try to understand what that person was feeling.

If that person is in the same place, the same dark theater with the same man coming over the same seat, sitting next to the person that's accused, I think that -- you know, I don't think there's a relevancy issue at all here. She can certainly say

she was scared to death.

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MR. MARTIN: Judge, what we're talking about is Mr. Reeves and what ever perceptions he had. We can't impute what Ms. Reeves might feel like as an elementary school teacher, a banker and going and working as a secretary to a seasoned veteran police officer. It just doesn't -- you can't make that logical leap that one will feel like the other.

It's not relevant as to how she felt about the situation. We haven't even had the same predicate that she saw even the same things that Reeves did. There are too many variables here to impute:

Because she was scared, he had the right to be scared, so I object to relevancy.

THE COURT: All right. I'm going to overrule it. I'm very certain that if her testimony was that she wasn't scared at all, the State would find that very relevant, so I think it's relevant and I will overrule.

BY MR. MICHAELS:

- Q. So how did you feel that day as a result of that day? How did it affect you emotionally?
 - A. That day --

No. Where is Mr. Oulson related to -- in relation 22 Q. 23 to where you're sitting? 24 He's in front of me. Α. 25 Mr. Oulson is directly in front of you? Q.

1 A. Yes.

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- Q. And your husband is on the movie screen, and you're seated in your seat. Where is your husband?
 - A. He's to my left in front of Mrs. Oulson.
- Q. Okay. Now, when you sit down, what happens? What do you do? Do you take popcorn?
- A. I took a Ziplock bag and I took part of the popcorn so I could hold mine and he could hold his.
- Q. Now, you have your popcorn. What's on the screen as you're sitting there?
- A. It was not the previews. I don't remember exactly, but it wasn't the previews.
 - Q. Now, at some point the previews come on?
- 14 A. Yes.
- Q. And describe to the Court how you know the previews are on.
 - A. They played the thing -- they played the message to discontinue using your cell phones, and then the previews came on.
 - Q. Did the lights change?
- 21 A. Yes, much darker.
 - Q. What about the sound coming from the screen?
- 23 A. Very, very loud.
- Q. Now you're seated there. The previews are on.

 Do you see your husband lean forward at all?

1 A. Yes.

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- Q. Do you hear anything that he says?
 - A. He spoke so softly, I don't think I did.
 - Q. Did you see who he appeared to be talking to or leaning towards?
 - A. Mr. Oulson.
 - Q. Did you hear Mr. Oulson say anything?
- 8 A. Yes, I did.
 - Q. Okay. Now, I know you don't want to use the words but it's important that you use the exact words that you recall. What did you recall Mr. Oulson saying?
 - A. He used the word "fuck" or "fucking." He was very loud, and I think he -- the word "texting" and his daughter.
 - Q. And when you heard that, the previews were on?
- 16 A. Yes.
- 17 Q. And his voice was louder than the previews?
- 18 | A. Yes.
- 19 Q. Now, how did that make you feel?
- A. It scared me. I was horrified that somebody would act like that, especially in a movie theater.
 - Q. Did you do anything at that point?
- 23 A. No.
- Q. What did your husband do?
- 25 A. He started to stand and he said, "I'm going to

1 go get the manager."

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And I said, "Let's just move," and he just continued on.

- Q. Do you know whether your husband heard you or not?
 - A. I don't.
 - Q. Did he answer you in any way?
- A. No.
- Q. Now, your husband's off. He told you he's going to see the manager. You're still in your seat.

 What feelings are going through you at that point?
- A. I don't want to be there, and I don't look

 at -- I don't look at Mr. Oulson. It's like if I don't

 look at him, he's not there.
 - O. Kind of like a child?
- 16 A. Yes.
- Q. Why were you feeling that way? Were you still afraid?
- A. Yes, I -- well, I don't know if I was afraid at
 that point, but I just thought it was an awful way to
 act. We don't talk like that in my house.
 - Q. Now, are you looking at the screen or what are you doing?
 - A. Probably.
- Q. Now, at some point does your husband come back?

1 A. Yes.

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- Q. Now tell me, when your husband walked past you to go to the manager, did you hear him grumbling at all?
 - A. No, I didn't hear anything.
- Q. Was he acting in any way that you could tell that he was angry in any way?
 - A. No.
 - Q. Was he doing anything other than walking slowly down the aisle?
 - A. That's what he was doing.
- Q. Now, he comes back in a couple of minutes?
- 12 | A. Yes.
- Q. Do you remember that?
- 14 A. Yes.
- Q. What happened when your husband comes back?
- A. I hand him his popcorn and he sits down.
- Q. He sits back next to you?
- 18 A. Yes.
- 19 Q. And he takes his popcorn?
- 20 A. Yes.
- 21 Q. What do you see next?
- Now, before we get there, when your husband sits down next to you, are you paying any attention to Mr. Oulson when your husband first sits down or are you still --

- 1 A. No, I'm not focused on him.
- 2 Q. You're still hoping everything will go away?
 - A. Yes.

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- 4 Q. Tell me what the next thing is that happens.
- A. They both spoke, and I don't know who spoke first, but Curtis leaned forward again.
 - Q. Could you hear any words that Curtis said?
 - A. I couldn't hear anything Curtis said.
 - Q. Could you hear anything that Mr. Oulson said?
- 10 A. Yes.
- 11 Q. What did Mr. Oulson say?
- 12 A. "You told on me. Who the fuck do you think you are?"
- 14 Q. Were the previews on?
- 15 A. Yes.
- Q. Was that statement that you just said Mr.

 Oulson said, "Who the fuck do you think you are," was
 that louder than the previews?
 - A. Well, it was -- I can't say that it was louder than the previews, but it was loud enough to be heard.
 - Q. It was loud enough for you to hear over the previews?

- Q. Are you looking now towards that direction or are you still kind of looking straight ahead?

- A. Well, I looked when Curtis leaned forward.
- Q. What happened next?
- A. Mr. Oulson quickly stood up and turned and he leaned forward, and I thought he was coming over.
- Q. Okay. So right after you heard, "Who the fuck do you think you are," Mr. Oulson got up and faced you and your husband?

MR. MARTIN: Your Honor, I'm going to object to constant summarizing of testimony the way that Mr. Michaels would like it perceived. This is a who, what, where, how type of direct examination.

MR. MICHAELS: Judge, I appreciate the prosecutor's criticisms; however, this is an old prosecutor's method and I think they call it looping in law school. We're just getting to the next question the same way the prosecutors do in every single trial. There's -- we're just reframing the question.

This is a lay witness. She's obviously upset.

I want to keep her focused and we want her to

continue on telling what happened, so we're just

trying to frame it. I'm not testifying at all.

MR. MARTIN: Judge, we don't need to loop the last five minutes of conversation. If he wants to say, "Okay, he sat down and he had popcorn. What

1 happened next? After he got the popcorn, what 2 happened next?" But we don't loop the last five 3 minutes to get to what happened next. 4 MR. MICHAELS: Respectfully, I will let 5 Mr. Martin question people the way he wishes to. Ι 6 would beg the Court to allow me to question the 7 witnesses the way that I wish to. 8 THE COURT: All right, as long as you don't loop five minutes' worth. 9 10 MR. MICHAELS: All right. I promise it won't 11 be five minutes. 12 THE COURT: Thank you. 13 BY MR. MICHAELS: 14 Q. Okay. Now, you have Mr. Oulson saying, "Who 15 the fuck do you think you are," and he stands up. 16 that point is the theater dark? 17 Yes. Α. 18 0. And are the previews on? 19 Α. Yes. 20 You're looking at Mr. Oulson at that point and 21 you see him lunging forward; is that correct? 22 Α. - Q. Okay. So do you remember your husband saying those exact words, "Stop," or do you remember it as one word, or tell me what you remember.
 - A. No. If I heard anything, that was the word "phone." That's all I heard.
- Q. The police officer said you told him, and there's a recording of it, that your husband handed the gun to the off-duty police officer.
 - A. No, he picked it up.
 - Q. Off of his lap?
- 15 A. Yes.

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- Q. And, again, while you're giving the answers to these questions, are you crying?
- 18 A. I may have stopped, but I was at first.
- 19 Q. Okay. Were you shaking?
- 20 A. Yes.
- Q. Were you upset?
- 22 A. Very upset.
- Q. Were you still frightened from what happened in the theater?
- 25 A. Yes.

Q. Did you ever hear your husband say, "Stop playing with your phone" --

A. No.

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- Q. -- to Mr. Oulson?
- A. No.
- Q. What happened after you spoke with a detective?
- A. I spoke to two detectives. I was concerned about Curtis, you know, and I asked him about -- I asked about Curtis, you know, what -- and what do I do?

And he said, "We'll take good care of him and he'll call you tonight," and then they took Matt and I to stand outside the theater where you buy your -- I don't think it's where you buy your tickets, but we were on the outside and they said, "Don't leave."

And they said that -- they asked permission to search my car and said that they might impound it, and --

- Q. Did you give them permission to do that?
- A. I did. I gave permission.
- Q. Okay. At some point you leave the theater?
 - A. Yes. Matt left his truck and drove me home.
 - Q. Okay.

MR. MICHAELS: Your Honor, I've shown the prosecutor what has been marked as Defense Exhibit 60. I'm going to have to have it marked by the Court Clerk.

1 Mr. Martin needs some time to contemplate 2 whether there would be an objection or not at this 3 point, so if we could have that marked. 4 THE COURT: It only gets marked when it comes 5 in. 6 MR.  - A. Nothing special.
- Q. Now, when Mr. Reeves left the house on January 13, 2014, to meet your son, Matt, at the movies at Cobb Theater, he had a loaded pistol in his right pocket; did he not?
- A. I wasn't aware of it. It's not something that we discuss. He doesn't say, "I've got my gun." I don't ask have you got your gun?" It's just assumed.

Q. And on that day you assumed he had his gun?

- A. I didn't think about it.
- Q. The car that you drove to the movies that day, whose car is what?
 - A. It was the car that I drove most of the time.
- Q. The more than fifty rounds of ammunition that was in the car, in the console area of the car, does that ammunition belong to you?
 - A. No.

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- Q. You saw that ammunition in the car; did you not?
- 12 A. No, I didn't.
 - Q. Is there anyone else who would have had access to the cars to put a box of ammunition in the car?
 - A. No.
- 16 Q. Only Mr. Reeves?

- Q. As you walk past those doors, knowing or assuming that Mr. Reeves has a loaded pistol in his pocket, you walk right by the sign, the little circle with the line through it that says, "No guns, no knives"

- 22 | Q. -- right?
- 23 THE COURT: Overruled.
- 24 BY MR. MARTIN:

- 24 to -- "there's a sign there that says -- maybe you should
- 25 leave your gun out there, because they don't want them in

1 here." You didn't tell him that, did you? 2 Α. No. 3 Q. Now, there was a -- as you testified, before 4 the previews there was an advertisement or notice up on 5 the screen that says, "Please put away your cell phones," 6 right? 7 Α. Yes. 8 Q. You felt that was important? 9 Yes. Α. 10 All right. So that the patrons can enjoy the Q. 11 movie experience, if you will? 12 Α. Yes. 13 All right. And did you find that any more 14 important than the Cobb Theater putting the placard on 15 the front door saying, "Please don't bring your gun in"? 16 MR. MICHAELS: Objection. Relevancy. What she 17 thinks is more important, one or the other, is 18 irrelevant. 19 It goes to what she did and how MR. MARTIN: 20 she acted with her husband. 21 MR. MICHAELS: Judge --22 MR. MARTIN: Judge --23 MR. MICHAELS: -- we're literally asking her to 24 compare an apple and an orange. That's what we're 25 doing.

1 THE COURT: I will overrule it, but let's not 2 go much further in that route. 3 BY MR. MARTIN: 4 0. My question to you, do you feel that that sign that says, "Please don't" -- it doesn't say, "Please," 5 6 but it says, "Don't bring your guns and knives into our 7 theater" --8 MR. MICHAELS: Objection. That's a 9 mischaracterization of what the sign is in the 10 front. There's been no evidence that's what the 11 sign is. 12 MR. MARTIN: She just indicated she realized it 13 was there. She admitted it was there. I'm just 14 going forward to what she's already testified to. 15 MR. MICHAELS: I think the question originally had to do with a circle and a slash kind of thing. 16 17 At least that's what the hand motion Mr. Martin was 18 making. 19 Now we have some hand motion indicating kind of 20 the script going back and forth of some sort. 21 THE COURT: Clarify first. 22 BY MR. MARTIN: 23 There's a placard that's a circle with a line Q. 24 through it, almost like a universal symbol. Something

behind that means: We don't want it, right? You're

aware of that?

- A. Yes.
- Q. All right. And that's a type of symbol. There were no words. It was just a picture of a knife and a gun with a circle with a line through it, right?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. All right.
- A. I don't -- I cannot describe it exactly. I know I've seen it, but I can't describe it.
- Q. And you know that to be universally accepted, with no words, that whatever is behind that circle with a line through, it's something that is prohibited in that area?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Okay. So my question to you is when you heard the advisement about no cell phones, put them away before the movie starts, that prohibition, did you feel that that prohibition was any more important than the one out front dealing with the circle with the line: No guns?
 - A. I think it depends on the person.
 - Q. Depends on the person.

Do you believe that Cobb Theater has the right not only to ask that phones be put away for the benefit of the patrons and also had a right to prohibit firearms in their theater?

1 Objection. Calls for MR. MICHAELS: 2 speculation. There's been no predicate that's been 3 laid that she has any sort of knowledge. 4 THE COURT: Sustained. I didn't ask for --5 MR. MARTIN: 6 MR. MICHAELS: (Indiscernible.) 7 MR. MARTIN: I didn't ask for speculation I 8 asked in her opinion, and she is a lay person and can render that opinion. 9 10 MR. MICHAELS: An opinion as to why Cobb 11 Theater is doing something? 12 THE COURT: Sustained. 13 BY MR. MARTIN: 14 Q. Once you go into the concession area and you 15 purchase the food items for the movie, Mr. Reeves still 16 has the loaded pistol in his right pocket? 17 Α. Yes. 18 As you walk into Theater 10 and begin to walk 0. 19 up the stairs to find your seat, Mr. Reeves still has the 20 loaded pistol in his right pocket; does he not? 21 Α. Yes. 22 As he's walking down the aisle and you're 23 following him down the aisle until you actually take the 24 seat and you sit down with your popcorn and your drink 25 and your -- whatever that candy was, Mr. Reeves still had

- a loaded pistol in his right pocket, right?
 - A. He never took it out, so, yes.
- Q. Okay. Now, you indicated that once you took your seat at some point in time you realized that Mr. and Mrs. Oulson were in front of you. I believe you indicated that Mr. Oulson was in front of you and Mrs. Oulson was in front of you and Mrs.
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. -- is that correct?
 - A. Yes.

Q. Okay. It was your husband, was it not, that initiated the nonconsensual contact with Mr. Oulson by leaning forward and speaking to him, correct?

MR. MICHAELS: Objection to the characterization as nonconsensual contact. He leaned forward apparently and maybe whispered something, but the characterization of nonconsensual contact, Judge, shouldn't be allowed here. It's impermissible.

MR. MARTIN: That's what it was. Let me follow it up.

BY MR. MARTIN:

Q. Mrs. Reeves, did Mr. Oulson, before Mr. Reeves had any contact, turn around and say, "Hey, buddy. Nice to see you. If you want to talk to me any time, just

1 lean forward and you can talk to me"? Did he say that? 2 Α. No. 3 All right. Tongue in cheek a little bit, but 4 there was no sign on his back saying, "Hey, anybody can 5 talk to me," right? 6 Α. No. 7 0. I mean tongue in cheek, but that was not the case, right? 8 9 Α. No. 10 MR. MICHAELS: Judge, objection. This is 11 The Court has inherent power to protect harassment. 12 a witness from being harassed. 13 MR. MARTIN: I'm moving on. 14 THE COURT: I think that is in response to the 15 objection, but let's -- yeah, let's --16 MR. MARTIN: I'm moving on. 17 THE COURT: Let's move on. 18 MR. MARTIN: All right. 19 BY MR. MARTIN: 20 Mr. Oulson had absolutely no contact with your 21 husband until your husband, Mr. Reeves, leaned forward 22 and had contact with Mr. Oulson; isn't that correct? 23 Α. Yes. 24 Mr. Oulson never turned around and said Q. 25 anything to Mr. Reeves before Mr. Reeves leaned forward

1 and had contact with Mr. Oulson? 2 Α. Verbal contact? 3 0. Verbal contact. Leaning forward. 4 right? That's what you said. Right. He didn't touch him. 5 6 All right. And at the time that Mr. Reeves 7 chose to have that contact with Mr. Oulson and lean 8 forward and say whatever you said he said, he had that 9 gun in his right pocket; did he not? 10 Α. Yes, sir. 11 Now, you've watched the video. We're not going 12 to play the video again, but just to remind you that you 13 had watched it. You watched the whole thing. 14 After that initial contact with Mr. Oulson he 15 had a second contact with Mr. Oulson, didn't he? 16 Α. Yes. 17 And that was after Mr. Oulson, according to Ο. 18 you, had some kind of nasty things to say back to your 19 husband, right? 20 Α. Yes. 21 So after your husband, Mr. Reeves, knew that 0. 22 Mr. Oulson really didn't want to have any more contact --23 MR. MICHAELS: Objection. Speculation. Now 24 we're talking about how he knew he didn't want to

have contact.

1 THE COURT: Sustained. 2 Rephrase. 3 MR. MARTIN: I will, and I appreciate that, 4 Judge. 5 BY MR. MARTIN: 6 The comments made by Mr. Oulson back to 7 Mr. Reeves clearly indicated that he didn't want to have 8 any contact with your husband, right? 9 MR. MICHAELS: Objection. It would be 10 speculation on her part. All she knows is that she 11 was scared to death when she heard that. 12 She heard disparaging remarks. MR. MARTIN: It 13 wasn't, "Hi. Nice talking to you." 14 THE COURT: Overruled. 15 MR. MICHAELS: She doesn't know what Mr. Reeves 16 was thinking. That's what he's asking. 17 THE COURT: No, I didn't think that was what he 18 was --19 MR. MARTIN: No, that's not. 20 THE COURT: All right. 21 THE WITNESS: Would you ask me that again? 22 MR. MARTIN: Sure. 23 BY MR. MARTIN: 24 Based on Mr. Oulson's response to your Q. 25 husband's first contact, there was nothing about that

response that would indicate to anyone that he welcomed that first contact, right?

A. Right.

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- Q. And as you previously testified just a few minutes ago, Mr. Reeves then leaned forward and had a second contact with him, right?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. And he did that after Mr. Oulson's words to him were clearly not friendly, right?
 - A. Right.
- Q. And he leaned forward and had a second contact with Mr. Oulson while he had a loaded pistol in his right pocket, right?
 - A. Yes, sir.
- Q. After that second contact Mr. Reeves had one last contact with Mr. Oulson before he got up and left for the manager, right?
- A. I don't recall all those contacts. When you said second contact, I thought you meant when he came back from the manager.
 - Q. No, ma'am. You know we weren't talking about that.
 - MR. MICHAELS: Judge, objection.
- MR. MARTIN: We were talking about before he went to the manager.

1 THE COURT: Let's keep the comments. 2 MR. MARTIN: I understand, Judge. 3 MR. MICHAELS: And number 2, Your Honor, the 4 testimony from this witness was that she didn't remember the second contact. 5 6 THE WITNESS: I just -- I don't. 7 MR. MICHAELS: We looked at the video and she 8 said she didn't remember it. 9 MR. MARTIN: Now Mr. Michaels is testifying for 10 his witness. May I just please conduct my 11 cross-examination, please? 12 THE COURT: Go ahead. 13 MR. MARTIN: Thank you. BY MR. MARTIN: 14 15 Before Mr. Reeves got up and went to complain 16 to the manager, he had one last contact with 17 Mr. Oulson --18 MR. MICHAELS: Objection to the 19 characterization of the contact with the manager as 20 a complaint. There's been no evidence regarding 21 that Mr. Reeves did anything but politely go to the 22 management station. We had not heard one thing 23 where Mr. Reeves was complaining. 24 MR. MARTIN: This is cross-examination. 25 THE COURT: I'll overrule as to that objection.

1 BY MR. MARTIN:

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- Q. As -- or right before Mr. Reeves got up to go complain to the manager, he had one last contact with Mr. Oulson; did he not?
 - A. I don't remember that.
- Q. Something to the effect of, "I'm going to the manager," or something like that?
- A. He told me that. I don't know if he told Mr. Oulson that.
- 10 Q. Okay. And you said, "Well, let's just move,"
 11 right?
- 12 A. Yes.
- Q. All right. Now, you know where we are in the scenario, right? Mr. Reeves is standing up and he's going to complain to the manager, right? That's where we're at. That's all I'm talking about.
 - A. He didn't say, "I'm going to go complain." He said, "I'm going to get the manager."
- Q. He's leaving the theater to go to the manager.

 All right?
 - A. All right.
- 22 Q. Thank you.
- Now, you explained on direct examination that at that point you were scared, right?
 - A. I was uncomfortable because I'm not used to

such language, and I'm not used to people acting like that.

- Q. You didn't tell us on direct examination that you were scared and frightened?
- A. That happened after Mr. Oulson stood up.

 I probably was scared because I was just shocked. I was shocked that somebody would act like that.
- Q. And you've been married, what, 49 years?
- 10 A. Yes.

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- Q. And Mr. Reeves would be well aware of how things affect you, right?
- 13 A. Yes.
- Q. And when he went, got up and was walking to
 leave to go to the manager or get the manager, you
 indicated to him, "Let's just move," something like that?
- 17 A. Yes.
- Q. He just kept on walking, didn't he?
- 19 A. Yes. I don't know if he heard me or not.
- Q. He left you there?
- 21 A. Yes.
- 22 Q. And you were scared and frightened --
- 23 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. -- and he left you?
- 25 A. Yes.

Q. He walked out of that theater with a loaded pistol in his pocket to go complain to the manager, leaving you in your seat scared, right?

- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. Mr. Reeves is gone maybe two minutes?
- A. I don't know how long. A short time.
- Q. Could we agree on "short" being less than five minutes?
- A. Yes.

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- Q. Okay. Ballpark, just a bracket, right?
- 11 A. Yes.
- Q. The entire time that you were there, did you take it upon yourself to get up and leave and go sit someplace else?
- 15 A. No, I didn't. I thought about it, but I didn't.
- Q. Mr. Oulson is sitting right in front of you, less than two feet away from you, right?
 - A. Right.
 - Q. And this is the man that had that kind of terse conversation with your husband that resulted in him leaving?
- 23 A. Yes.
- Q. Mr. Oulson, while he was sitting there and your husband was gone, he never turned around and spoke to

1 you, did he?

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- A. No, I wasn't looking at him, no. He didn't speak to me.
- Q. He never got up, turned around and spoke to you?
 - A. No.
 - Q. He never spoke to you, without turning his head, in a loud voice so you could hear him?
 - A. No.
 - Q. Basically he ignored that you were even there?
- 11 A. Yeah.
- Q. There comes a time that Mr. Reeves returned from going to the manager, and he comes back and he begins to walk down the aisle. That's what I want to talk about. Okay?
 - A. Okay.
 - Q. When he returned and then starts to walk down the aisle, he has to walk past you, right?
- 19 A. Yes.
 - Q. I'll try to phrase it in a way -- I know it's not literal, but if we're in a movie theater and someone is in front of you, you have to step over, around, or whatever, to get past him, right?
- 24 A. Right.
- Q. That's what Mr. Reeves did in this particular

case? He had to get past your feet and the aisle and your knees because it's just a very close area, right?

- A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And there were some other people sitting down the way also that he had to get by?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. While Mr. Reeves was gone, at any time did you see Mr. Oulson in any way in possession, using, however you want to describe it, his cell phone?
 - A. No, sir, but I wasn't looking at Mr. Oulson.
 - Q. Could you see his wife, Nicole?
 - A. I wasn't looking at her, either.
- Q. You saw the two people, you saw the person in front of you just out of your peripheral vision, if you will, and you were looking at the screen; would that be safe to say?
 - A. It might be.
- Q. Okay. When Mr. Reeves returned, were you under the same assumption that he had a loaded pistol in his right pocket?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. As he was walking past you, of course, as he walked past you Mr. Oulson is right in front of you.

 Does Mr. Oulson turn at all to acknowledge that someone is walking behind him?

A. Not that I'm aware.

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- Q. Does Mr. Oulson say anything to Mr. Reeves as he walked behind him?
 - A. (No response.)
- Q. Does Mr. Oulson say anything to your husband as he walked behind him?
 - A. I think that occurred a little bit later.
- Q. I appreciate you saying that. We want to keep it as he returned to his seat before he sits down, okay.

So my question to you is when he's returning from the manager, before he sits down to take out the popcorn, does Mr. Oulson say anything to Mr. Reeves?

- A. Not that I remember.
- Q. Does Mr. Oulson turn without saying anything and, like, glare at him or have a frowny face, or whatever you want to call it, to look mean?
- A. I don't know that. I did not see that, but I wasn't looking at him.
- Q. Did you have any indication before Mr. Reeves sat down, after returning from the manager, that Mr. Oulson had any contact whatsoever with your husband?
 - A. Before my husband sat down?
 - Q. Yes, ma'am.
- A. I don't remember any contact.
- 25 Q. Now, when Mr. Reeves returned and begins to sit

down, either as he's sitting down or just after he sits
down, Mr. Reeves has contact again with Mr. Oulson; does
he not?

- A. Right, but I handed -- before that happened, I handed Curtis his popcorn, and then he sat down.
 - Q. Yes, ma'am. Thank you.

Now, after -- that particular contact with Mr. Oulson was no different than the first contact with Mr. Oulson in that it was not solicited by Mr. Oulson, Mr. Reeves took it upon himself to lean forward and again have contact with Mr. Oulson, correct?

- A. He leaned forward, but I don't know who spoke first.
- Q. And this is the same man that while, before Mr. Reeves left, contact was such that you were scared and frightened?
- A. Yes.

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- Q. All right. This was the same man that had the one, two, if not three contacts with him before he went to the manager and there was some argument and some very nasty remarks, right?
 - A. I don't --
- Q. The same man?
- 24 A. The same man, but I don't call it an argument.
- Q. Okay. And when Mr. Reeves leaned forward to

that same man that had those very disturbing remarks,

like you described them, back to Mr. Reeves, he did so

with a loaded pistol in his right pants pocket; did he

not?

- A. When Mr. Reeves leaned forward?
- Q. Uh-huh.
- A. Yes.

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- Q. You mentioned during direct examination that after the shot was fired, that you saw a cell phone in the area of Mr. Reeves' feet. Do you remember that?
- A. Yes.
- Q. You didn't see anybody throw a cell phone, did you?
- 14 A. I did not.
- Q. As we discussed previously, Mr. Oulson was seated right in front of you?
- 17 | A. Yes.
- 18 Q. Less than two feet away from you?
- 19 A. Yes.
- Q. You mentioned in direct that there came a point in time when Mr. Oulson stood up?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. When Mr. Oulson stood up -- this would be you back here, okay. Now I'm going to reverse it so that I can talk to you, okay? I'm going to be Mr. Oulson, and

1 | this would be his chair and you would be there. Okay?

A. Okay.

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- Q. Mr. Oulson never got in his chair, came up come over and got into your aisle, did he, got in -- stood in your aisle?
 - A. No, but I thought he was.
 - Q. You thought he was in your aisle?
 - A. No, I thought he was coming into our aisle.
 - Q. He never got in --
- 10 A. I did not see him in our aisle.
- Q. Okay. When Mr. Oulson stood up, he stood up after your husband, Mr. Reeves, had contact with him, right?
- 14 A. Yes.
- Q. And when Mr. Oulson stood up, Mr. Reeves had a loaded pistol in his right front pocket; did he not?
- 17 A. Yes. He never took it out.
- 18 Q. You mentioned on direct that after the shot was
 19 fired you saw popcorn on the floor?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. And that was the popcorn that was tossed at Mr. Reeves; was it not?
- 23 | A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And hit Mr. Reeves?
- 25 A. I didn't actually see it. I saw it on the

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- Q. Okay.
- A. Because I wasn't looking at Mr. Oulson.
- Q. I appreciate you telling me that, because I want to separate what you saw on the video from your memory, so thank you for that.

And my question to you was: Mr. Oulson never, with a closed fist, hit your husband in the face, did he?

- A. Not that I saw, but I wasn't looking.
- Q. You were sitting right next to Mr. Reeves when he began to pull the pistol out of his pocket; were you not?
- A. Yes, I was.
- Q. Okay. You saw Mr. Reeves kind of lean over on his left butt cheek, stretch his leg out? Did you see that?
 - A. He leaned way back, yes, to the left.
 - Q. Uh-huh. Stretched out his right leg?
- 19 A. Yes, sir.
- Q. And after you saw Mr. Reeves lean back and,
 like you said, I would guess if I'm Mr. Reeves it would
 be to his left, right --
- 23 A. Yes.
- 24 Q. -- and stretch out the right leg, right?
- 25 A. Yes.

- Q. It was after that that the shot was fired, right?
 - A. Yes.

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- Q. Okay. And sitting right next to your husband, Mr. Reeves, when he's drawing or pulling the pistol out of his pants pocket, you also noticed that his right leg had come back, right, so he can sit up?
 - A. No. I didn't see him draw the gun.
- Q. All right. When he shot the firearm, shot the pistol that was in his right front pants pocket, he was seated in his seat, right?
 - A. From the video I see that he was.
 - Q. All right. And he was leaning forward?
- 14 A. I think they showed that.
 - Q. Okay. And Mr. Reeves, when he drew the pistol and pointed it at Mr. Oulson, he didn't bring it up to his eyes and take a bead on him down the sight, did he?
- 18 A. I did not witness that.
- 19 Q. You didn't see this, either?
- 20 A. No, I didn't.
- Q. Mr. Reeves shot, fired the pistol when it was low, a little bit above his thigh, right?
- 23 A. I don't know.
- Q. Okay. When Mr. Reeves fired the pistol,
 Mr. Oulson was in his aisle; was he not?

1 A. I don't know.

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- Q. When Mr. Reeves shot Mr. Oulson, Mr. Oulson was not leaning over, climbing over the seat at your husband, was he?
 - A. I don't know, Mr. Martin.

After Mr. Oulson -- after I thought he was coming over the seat, I don't know what happened. It's just gone. I didn't know that day and I still don't know.

- Q. After your husband, Mr. Reeves, shot Mr.

 Oulson, you turned to him, did you not, and say to him,

 "That was no cause to shoot"?
- A. No, sir, I didn't.
- Q. You did not tell Mr. Reeves that there was no cause to shoot that man?
- A. I certainly don't -- do not think I said that.

 I know what I said, but I don't think I said that.
 - Q. Mr. Reeves then told you, "Don't say another word"?
- 20 A. He did not.
 - Q. Is that when you got up and moved three seats away?
- A. When Mr. -- when the off-duty officer was

 pulling the magazine to the gun, I believe Curtis told me

 to move away, but I said something to him.

1 Q. To who?

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- 2 A. To Curtis.
 - Q. But we've just discussed that, right?
- 4 A. But what you said is not what I said.
 - Q. I know. That's why I said, we just discussed that, right? I indicated to you, Did you say this and you said no.
- 8 A. Okay.
- 9 Q. Is that what we're talking about? You didn't 10 say anything more than that, did you?
- 11 A. Yes, I did. What you said is not what I said.
- 12 Q. Okay.
- A. You didn't ask me what I said.
- 14 Q. No, but Mr. Michaels did.
- 15 A. Okay.
- Q. When you looked over and looked at your husband, Mr. Reeves, after the shooting, did you see any blood about his face?
- 19 A. I didn't see blood.
- 20 Q. Did you see -- do you know the difference 21 between an abrasion and a laceration, a cut and a scrape?
 - A. Okay, yes.
- Q. Okay. Did you sees any cuts on his face?
- A. No, but I didn't look. I looked from the side.
- 25 I never looked at his face.

When Mr. Hamilton -- when I asked to pick up the phone because I thought it was Curtis's, Mr. Hamilton said, "Don't touch anything," and I felt like that meant Curtis, too.

- Q. Okay. But we're talking about what you observed as far as injuries. Do you remember looking at the picture --
 - A. From the right side of his face.
- Q. Well, actually, that's the left side of his face that you pointed to.
- A. Oh, right, but I'm saying that when I was seated in the theater, I did not see the left side of his face.
- Q. When did you make the observations, then, that you told us about in the photograph about the left side of his face?
 - A. Just looking at the photograph.
- O. Just now?
- 19 A. Yes.

- Q. Did you see anything about Mr. Reeves' face that would suggest to you that a paramedic needed to come and tend to your husband?
- MR. MICHAELS: Objection. Speculation.
- How does she know what a paramedic needs to come for? Some people have a bone hanging out and

No. 23 Now, did you ever imagine in your wildest 24 nightmare that somebody would behave like this in a movie 25 theater?

1	A. No.
2	MR. MARTIN: Your Honor, I'm going to object.
3	MR. MICHAELS: I don't have anything else,
4	Judge .
5	THE COURT: Anything else, Mr. Martin?
6	May this witness be excused?
7	MR. MICHAELS: We would ask that she remain on
8	subpoena for future recall.
9	MR. MARTIN: And the State would also ask that
10	she remain under subpoena for the State's subpoena.
11	THE COURT: Ms. Reeves, you're allowed
12	you're free to go today, but you will remain under
13	subpoena subject to recall at a later time. Okay?
14	(Witness excused.)
15	THE COURT: Who's next?
16	MR. ESCOBAR: Your Honor, we have two witnesses
17	that we need to call today because one of them is
18	having some therapy tomorrow, so just two witnesses
19	today. We intended to call tomorrow, but we brought
20	them in today to get them done.
21	THE COURT: Hopefully they aren't extremely
22	lengthy.
23	Who are you calling first?
24	MR. MICHAELS: Defense calls Robert Kerr.
25	THE BAILIFF: Step this way, stand right here.

1 Face the clerk, raise your right hand to be sworn. 2 (Thereupon, the witness was duly sworn on oath.) 3 THE BAILIFF: Come have a seat up here. Adjust 4 the mic. Speak in a loud and clear voice for the Court. 5 You may proceed, Counselor. THE COURT: 6 7 I'm going to cut to the chase MR. MICHAELS: 8 pretty quickly here, so I'm sure that's music to the 9 Court's ears. 10 THE COURT: Okay. 11 DIRECT EXAMINATION 12 BY MR. MICHAELS: 13 Q. Sir, please state your name. 14 Α. My name is Robert Kerr, K-E-R-R. 15 Okay. We will have to do -- only one of us can Q. 16 talk at a time, so I apologize for speaking over you. 17 Α. Okay. 18 You anticipated my question. 0. 19 Now, are you retired? 20 Α. I am. 21 From where? **Q**. 22 Α. City of Tampa. 23 And what did do you there? Q. 24 I was a supervisor at the water plant. Α. 25 Q. You don't know Mr. Reeves at all, do you?

1 A. No.

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- Q. Now, do you remember back in 2014 going to see the movie, Lone Survivor, on January 13th?
- A. Yes, I did.
- 5 Q. Who did you go there with?
- 6 A. My wife.
- Q. And was that at the Cobb Theater in Wesley
 8 Chapel?
- 9 A. Yeah.
- Q. And was that also for the matinee that you went?
- 12 A. Yeah, probably somewhere around 1:00.
- 13 Q. So you like to get there early?
- 14 A. Typically, yeah.
- Q. What area of the theater did you sit in? What I mean by that, the lower area by the screen and there's that kind of upper area?
- A. I would say the upper area, but not the CineBistro stuff.
- 20 Q. Okay.
- 21 A. Just the center section.
- Q. Now, there's a section that kind of has a railing?
- A. We were in the first row facing the screen, on the left side.

1 Okay. And you're right by the railing? Q. 2 Α. Right at the railing, yeah. 3 Did you get there before or after the previews Q. had started? 4 5 No, the previews -- before the preview started. Α. 6 Now, did something happen during the previews 0. 7 that drew your attention to a part of the theater? 8 Α. Yeah, I heard some --9 MR. GARCIA: Objection as to hearsay. 10 MR. MICHAELS: I asked him if something drew 11 his attention. 12 MR. GARCIA: His response was, "I heard." 13 THE COURT: Well, he can say what he heard 14 without saying the words. 15 THE WITNESS: Yes. It wasn't a conversation. 16 MR. MICHAELS: Okay. 17 BY MR. MICHAELS: 18 And was it loud enough to draw your attention? 0. 19 Yeah, it drew my attention. It was voices, but Α. 20 I couldn't hear what they were saying. 21 Okay. At some point did you hear somebody 0. 22 saying something that you could hear the words? Yeah --23 Α. 24 MR. GARCIA: Objection as to hearsay. 25 Judge, it's an excited MR. MICHAELS:

1 This is what we've discussed before. utterance. 2 It's the same statement. 3 MR. GARCIA: Judge, it's not an excited 4 utterance. I have a case directly on point. 5 If I can approach. 6 THE COURT: I am --7 MR. MICHAELS: If I can see the case. 8 MR. GARCIA: I'll give it to you. 9 THE COURT: Hold on. It's not your typical 10 type of excited utterance. Unless the Defense has 11 one to support their position, I'm going to sustain. 12 MR. MICHAELS: Well, it's not offered for the 13 truth of the matter asserted, either. It's offered 14 for this gentleman's --MR. GARCIA: Judge --15 16 MR. MICHAELS: If I can finish, it's not 17 offered for this gentleman's state of mind. he's feeling, he feels startled and he looks back. 18 19 MR. GARCIA: Do I even need to respond to that, 20 Judge? His state of mind? Okay. I mean, the case 21 law is clear, Judge. There are no exceptions. The 22 statement is not allowed in, so I don't know if he 23 has any other questions from this witness. 24 THE COURT: He -- I don't need to hear the 25 words.
