Well, 10 he's going to bring you some water. 11 MR. REEVES: And I don't care if it's 12 cold, as long as it's wet. DETECTIVE PROCTOR: All right, sir. 13 14 got some here, but you probably don't want to 15 drink after me because I have all kinds of --16 probably all kinds of -- well, we're bringing you some fresh water. 17 MR. REEVES: You telling me it's diseased? 18 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Well, I'm not saying 19 I've been a cop almost 30 years myself. 20 that. 21 MR. REEVES: I understand. I understand. 22 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: And I hate to talk to you about all this. 23 MR. REEVES: Well, I tell you dang truth, 24 25 I hate to be here. This is crazy. It was

1 absurd. I tell retired cops that you don't do 2 this, but I've never had anybody jump on my ass like that. 3 4 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right. 5 MR. REEVES: It's really off and 6 completely uncalled for. 7 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: I understand. So the What happens? 8 lights had dimmed down. 9 MR. REEVES: Well, the guy was playing 10 with his cell phone so I leaned over and I said, "Do you mind turning your cell phone 11 12 off?" 13 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right. MR. REEVES: And he told me to fuck off or 14 something like that. I can't remember. 15 16 lean back and he kept on doing it, so I got up 17 and I went and told the manager out front. 18 I said, look, we got a guy -- I said, I 19 asked him to turn his cell phone off. He was 20 playing with it. And he told me to fuck off so 21 I said I appreciate it (indiscernible). 22 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: So he kept doing it. 23 What -- what manager? 24 MR. REEVES: Oh, I don't know, whoever was sitting at the desk. Big heavyset guy with 25

1 glasses on. Whoever was sitting at the front 2 desk up there. I assume he was the manager 3 (indiscernible.) 4 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: But he's a heavyset 5 guy? MR. REEVES: 6 Yeah. 7 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Wearing glasses? 8 MR. REEVES: I think so. Observations 9 fade with retirement. DETECTIVE PROCTOR: I understand. 10 So what 11 happens then? 12 MR. REEVES: I come back in the movie. 13 And the guy put his phone away. And as I went 14 by, I said, "I see you put it away. I told the 15 manager for no reason." In other words, I went 16 in and ratted him out. If he was going to put 17 it away, I wouldn't have gone, you know. Make 18 sense? 19 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right. 20 MR. REEVES: And he turns around in his 21 seat and he says something about -- to get --22 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: He got it. And he -- he says 23 MR. REEVES: Yeah. something about he was -- I don't remember. 24 25 "If it was any of your fucking business, I was

texting my daughter," or something like that, and "You stay the hell out of my face." I think that's what he said. His wife was holding him back.

So I had sat down and I think I got the bag of popcorn from my wife. And then suddenly he jumps up and he turns around and he stands in his seat, which was -- well, you saw the crime scene. He was off to the right up there.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right.

MR. REEVES: So as he's pushing on the back, there's a crack between us. So I'm leaning back in my chair. I got nowhere to go.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Uh-huh.

MR. REEVES: And I'm leaning back in my chair. So he kept on hollering. And I'm not sure what he said, to be honest with you. He said something that led me to believe he was going to kick my ass. And I don't know if that's exactly how he phrased it or not.

So I'm looking briefly. I know I can't go anywhere. So I'm leaning all the way back in my chair as far as I can to get away from him. And suddenly he's virtually on top of me. So because I'm stretched out, if you'll look at

these pants, pistol was in the right front pocket.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Uh-huh.

MR. REEVES: And you're sitting down, ain't no way you can get it out. So I'm stretched out trying to get away from him.

My left arm is out in front of me. And I think I'm saying either no, no, no, or whoa, whoa, whoa, one or the other.

Then -- so I believe my head was to the right. So he hit me with something. And I assume it was his fist, but I don't know. You see -- do you have a mirror here? Something is wrong with my left eye. Anyway, I had them wash it out for me.

So he -- he hit me with his fist or with something. I think -- I think he had his cell phone in his hand because I saw the -- I saw the blur of the screen, I quess.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right.

MR. REEVES: And I got my left hand out in front of me and he hits me in the face and knocks my glasses sideways.

And there was a -- there was a young -- there was a young Sumter County deputy that

1 came over right afterwards. And I have frames 2 that don't -- you can bend them all over the 3 place --4 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Uh-huh. 5 MR. REEVES: -- but the left side was 6 stretched out, so --7 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: You say he knocked your glasses off? 8 MR. REEVES: They weren't off; they were 9 partially off. And I fixed them where they fit 10 my head again. And for a while there I was 11 12 kind of dazed, and it had to be from the strike, even if it was a glazing blow or 13 14 whatever. 15 But I felt like I had something in my eye; 16 still do, but not as bad. The fire department 17 guys rinsed it out with some kind of shit. 18 Anyway I'm leaning back. He's virtually 19 in my lap. I got -- I got contact with something with my left hand. It's dark in 20 21 there. I mean this happened so damn fast. 22 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Uh-huh. 23 MR. REEVES: And the trajectory of the 24 bullet should be upward because I came out of 25 my pocket with it. And I'm surprised I didn't

1 shoot myself in the hand. 2 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Uh-huh. MR. REEVES: But -- and good heaven, I 3 4 didn't mean to do that. That was just -- I had 5 to say that. I've counseled cops for --6 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: How many rounds you 7 shoot? MR. REEVES: One. I guess you could say I 8 9 was scared shitless. 10 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay. 11 MR. REEVES: I've got arthritis in both 12 hands and my back is a freaking wreck. I was 13 on SWAT for 15 years. We thought we were 14 Superman --15 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right. 16 MR. REEVES: -- and as you get older, you 17 find out you're a physical wreck. 18 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay. And you had 19 that gun in your right --20 MR. REEVES: It was in my right front 21 Stretched out. Like I said, you can pocket. 22 see the pockets here. 23 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Uh-huh. MR. REEVES: And you can't get it out if 24 25 you're not -- if you're not completely -- I'm

stretched out and my seat's sort of like this. 1 2 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right. MR. REEVES: And I'm holding -- I'm whoa, 3 whoa, whoa or no, no, one or the other. 4 . 2 And I'm hit in the face and it had to be him who did it. 6 7 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: You got any idea where 8 you shot him at? 9 MR. REEVES: I have no idea. I heard somebody say he was shot in the chest. 10 11 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: You see anything in 12 his hands? 13 MR. REEVES: I think he had the cell 14 When -- when -- when he turned away 15 from me, I looked down and his cell phone was 16 laying at my feet, so I think that's what he 17 hit me in the face with. I didn't see anything 18 I mean I don't know what you guys -else. 19 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: I hear you. Did your wife -- where was your wife at? 20 21 MR. REEVES: She was sitting on the 22 right-hand side. If she's paying attention, 23 bless her heart, she's -- you know, there's no justification for what happened in there so --24 25 DETECTIVE PROCTOR:

Right.

1 MR. REEVES: -- I understand her 2 (indiscernible). DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Where was your son at? 3 MR. REEVES: He wasn't there. 4 We were 5 waiting for him. We'd saved a seat for him and 6 all so --7 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: And this guy's sitting directly in front of you? 8 His wife, I think, or 9 MR. REEVES: No. whoever was with him. This lady was sitting 10 11 directly in front of me. He was off to the right side, which makes it -- if he'd have been 12 13 sitting straight in front of me, I'd have just 14 been whipped because I couldn't do anything. 15 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: And the row in front 16 of you, right, right side and right in front of 17 you? 18 MR. REEVES: Right. DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Just one chair? 19 MR. REEVES: What's the state of 20 Yeah. (indiscernible)? 21 22 We don't know yet. DETECTIVE PROCTOR: We've got people down there. It's not looking 23 24 good? 25 MR. REEVES: All over -- it's

1 (indiscernible). 2 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Yeah. Did --3 MR. REEVES: His wife was trying --4 whoever was with him was trying to hold him 5 back. 6 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right. What is he 7 saying to you? MR. REEVES: Fuck off, get out of my face, 8 I'm talking -- I was -- he was 9 fuck you. 10 siting there playing with it. And what he said to me was that he was texting his daughter. 11 Well, he wasn't. He was -- he was -- he was 12 13 scrolling through. 14 So I think when I leaned over and asked 15 him to turn his cell phone off, he told me to get the fuck out of his face. And so I knew 16 17 right away --DETECTIVE PROCTOR: What about just 18 19 immediately prior to the shot? What is he 20 saying to you? 21 MR. REEVES: He's saying -- I think that's 22 when he talking about he's texting his daughter if it was any of my -- there's "fuck" in there 23: 24 three or four times. I don't remember. 25 none of my fucking business or I'll kick your

fucking ass or -- it -- whatever he was saying was -- was threatening. I got to be candid with you. I don't remember (indiscernible).

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay.

MR. REEVES: It was enough for me to try to look for a way out. And my wife is saying -- when I got up to go tell the manager, she said, "Why don't we just" -- we should have just moved is what we should have done. And she said that after.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right.

MR. REEVES: And she's absolutely right.

That's exactly what we should have done, so -but if something -- when he jumped up and
turned around, I didn't -- there was no
problem. I mean it was just a guy mouthy.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right.

MR. REEVES: When he jumped on the seat and came over in between the crack between the two seats, that's when it scared me.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay. Now, you say he jumped up. Now, does he come over the seat or is he still on his row?

MR. REEVES: His feet -- his feet were on the seat, at least one of them was. And he was

pushing back with his hand and he was coming over the seat. Now, exactly where his feet were, I don't know. He was coming over into my area, where I'm sitting.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay.

MR. REEVES: And I'm -- and I'm saying,
"Whoa, whoa, whoa." It's like this is just a
cell phone. You know, this is nothing.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right.

MR. REEVES: I don't know if I was saying no, no, no or whoa, whoa. So he's coming over on me. I got to -- I'm pushing him off with my left hand and I had ahold of something. I'm assuming it was probably his chest. I don't know.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: With -- with your left hand?

MR. REEVES: With my left hand, right.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: As he's coming over -- do you actually make contact with his --

MR. REEVES: I make contact with something, his arm, his chest, shoulder. I'm saying no, no, no; whoa, whoa, whoa, whoa. And like they say in the books, it happened so fast.

And then as soon as I -- as soon as I pull the trigger, I said, "Oh, shit. This is stupid." But, again, I'm 71 years old. I don't need an ass whipping --

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right.

MR. REEVES: -- from a younger man.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: How old was he?

MR. REEVES: I don't know. I'm going to say 35, 40 maybe.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Did you -- did you think that he had something other than a cell phone?

MR. REEVES: I -- I had no idea what he had. I mean I -- I mean I just -- all I knew is the guy was coming after me. It was dark; the theater's dark. The show's on. I don't know what -- I don't know what -- I don't know him. I don't know -- I see that he's very explosive unnecessarily. I don't understand what his motivation is or why he wants to pursue something that's not worth pursuing. I had no idea what his motivation was.

But when he jumped up, like I said, it was not a big deal. But then when he started for me and he started yelling, then it scared the

crap out of me. I'm thinking holy crap, what's 1 2 going on here? So I -- and after he hit me --3 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: You keep saying he hit 4 you, but what is he hitting you with? 5 MR. REEVES: It was dark. I don't know. 6 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay. 7 I think he was wearing a dark MR. REEVES: 8 shirt. 9 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay. 10 MR. REEVES: Hell, I don't know. 11 Like I said, after he hit me, my face went 12 sideways, my glasses came partially off. 13 now I'm stretched out completely. I'm in my 14 seat kind of like this with my left hand out. 15 And when I shot he was -- hell, he should 16 have been pretty darn close to the contact. DETECTIVE PROCTOR: 17 Okay. 18 MR. REEVES: I know we're trained not to 19 stick it out in front of us, but --20 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right, right. 21 MR. REEVES: To be honest with you, I was 22 afraid I would shoot myself. It all happened 23 so fast, shit it's -- I'm thinking this guy is 24 fixing to do me -- do me some bad stuff. 25 If I had it to do over again, it would

1 never have happened. We would have moved, but 2 you don't get do-overs. 3 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: So what made you shoot 4 him? 5 MR. REEVES: Well, I guess it scared the 6 hell out of me. 7 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay. 8 MR. REEVES: I thought the guy was fixing 9 to beat the shit out of me. 10 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay. 11 MR. REEVES: I don't know how else to say 12 that. When my glasses --13 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: He -- he never told 14 you that, right? 15 MR. If I was 50 -- 20 22 years younger or something like that, I might 23 have just wrassled it out with him, but --24 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay. 25 MR. REEVES: -- but I'm not -- all that

REEVES: That's why I'm very surprised that -- the last time I shot that little 4 5 pistol, I couldn't hardly shoot it because I 6 have so much arthritis in my hand. 7 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right. 8 MR. straight and everything.

1 MR. REEVES: Oh, I know that. Yeah, you 2 talk to everybody before you --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: You've handled these kind of cases before. What would you expect us to do? What would you do if you were in our situation?

MR. REEVES: Oh, man. Well, let me put it this way: If I wasn't afraid of getting hurt or beaten up, it would -- I would have never pulled a pistol, first of all. And I trained cops when I was on the PD -- I actually trained Hillsborough County, a lot of those guys.

I would -- a lot of things are different.

When you're in law enforcement, you have

coverage if this happens. And what I tell

people is: If this ever happens to you, even

if you're a thousand right and the other people

are a thousand percent wrong, it's still not a

healthy thing to get involved in, that you

shouldn't (indiscernible).

So I was in training for years and that's -- and I still hang around with a bunch of retired SWAT guys. I was SWAT team commander for 15 years. And I still hang around with a bunch of those guys. And we

thought we were King Kong for a long time. And as it turns out, as you get older, you end up with all the injuries that you thought had gone away come back. So we're a bunch of cripples now, I guess you could say. We laugh and (indiscernible).

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: You're not intoxicated or anything like that, right?

MR. REEVES: I --

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: You know what's going on here?

MR. REEVES: I don't drink; I don't take drugs. I drank part of a cold drink and I was eating popcorn when the guy jumped up and turned around. So should be popcorn all over the place in front of where I was sitting because that went by the wayside almost immediately.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: How did that end up by the wayside?

MR. REEVES: I'm not sure. I'm not sure if I dropped it or if he knocked it out of my hand. I don't know. Okay. All I remember is after I shot him -- after I shot him, I laid the pistol on my -- on my -- on my leg.

DETECTIVE PROCTOR: 1 Uh-huh. 2 MR. REEVES: And I put my glasses back 3 on --4 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Uh-huh. 5 MR. REEVES: And a young man came over and said he was a Sumter County deputy --6 7 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right. 8 MR. REEVES: -- and I gave him my pistol. 9 I said here's the pistol and I said it's got 10 one in the chamber. 11 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay. 12 MR. REEVES: And then I straightened out 13 my glasses. I saw the popcorn on the floor. saw a cell phone right in front of me. 14 15 thought it was mine, but apparently it's his. And I'm thinking that's kind of what hit me. 16 17 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay. 18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: What kind of gun is 19 it? 20 MR. REEVES: It's a Kel-Tec .380. 21 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: (Indiscernible.) 22 You know that's something we're going to find 23 out. MR. REEVES: It's a -- it's a Thunderball 24 25 made by -- made by -- I forget now. It's some

1 good stuff. 2 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: And you only shot 3 one round? 4 MR. REEVES: Right. 5 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Let me go back to 6 that question I asked you. What would you 7 expect us to do? 8 MR. REEVES: Well, I would expect you --9 and I hate this term because I've been reading 10 the damn news. I was defending myself. 11 don't make it any easier for me to accept it, 12 but that's what I was doing. I was defending 13 myself (indiscernible) some serious injury. 14 The guy was very aggressive, considerably 15 younger. 16 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: If this guy dies, you think it was worth --17 18 MR. REEVES: Hey, man. 19 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Or your actions. 20 Nothing's worth it. 21 MR. REEVES: Nothing's worth it. 22 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: But you think the 23 actions that you took were -- could have been 24 elevated up to take his life? 25 I would like to say no. MR. REEVES:

1 would hope that the answer to that question 2 would be no, but unfortunately it's yes. I felt -- I mean I got a bruise on my arm that 3 takes 72 months to heal. I couldn't take an 4 5 ass whipping. I got a problem with my right 6 eye. The guy hit me on the left side. And I'm 7 thinking: Oh, shit, I don't want to be blind, I don't want to be any of those other things as 8 9 I get older. DETECTIVE PROCTOR: All right. 10 MR. REEVES: I haven't been scared by that 11 12 many people. Since I've been retired, nobody 13 has ever scared me. 1 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay. 2 MRS. REEVES: I heard him say F-U-C-K --DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay. 3 4 MRS. REEVES: -- but not my husband. 5 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay. 6 MRS. REEVES: And Curtis left and --7 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Curtis said he was 8 going to go get the manager? 9 MRS. REEVES: Yes. 10 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Okay. 11 MRS. REEVES: He came back by himself. I 12 don't -- I don't even know who said something first, but the guy said, "Who the fuck do you 13 think" -- and he stood up and moved over. And 14 then I heard popping. And when he stood up and 15 16 leaned over, I was (indiscernible). 17 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Then what happens? 18 MRS. REEVES: Everyone crowded around the 19 man that was shot. 1 MRS. REEVES: No. 2 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: And he said that he 3 had been hit. MRS. REEVES: Yes. 4 5 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Did you notice 6 anything about his person that would have 7 indicated that your husband had been hit? 8 MRS. REEVES: The popcorn was on the 9 floor, but I don't --10 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Do you know how that 11 got on the floor? 12 MRS. REEVES: I don't. And there was a phone on the floor --13 14 DETECTIVE PROCTOR: Right. 15 MRS. MR. ESCOBAR: I would, Your Honor, but I would also tell the Court that the affidavit, the arrest affidavit is part of this particular case. We had an Arthur hearing. The Court recalls part of the affidavit here was part of that original Arthur hearing, that we got the right to re-litigate without prejudice back in first appearance.

And so I'm also going to be going through the verbiage in this -- in this criminal report affidavit. I'll be more than glad to show it to the Court.

THE COURT: I have a copy of the arrest affidavit and I have reviewed it many times. Why is it necessary to go through the affidavit? Is it not superceded by the testimony the Court is having offered to it by the State for purposes of determining the

pretrial detention?

MR. ESCOBAR: Your Honor, I don't think so. I think that it goes hand and hand with his investigation and the evidence that was introduced at the previous hearing. And I have the right to confront that and to shed some light for this Court so that I, as I made my arguments in my motions --

THE COURT: I read those also last night.

MR. ESCOBAR: -- there wasn't PC at the

time of the initial appearance and there wasn't

evidence that was, you know, presumption great

proof evident.

THE COURT: Let's say that that was the case hypothetically. What differences does that make today if the previous ruling may or may not -- and I'm not ruling one way or the other. But say the previous ruling was incorrect. What difference does that make today given that I'm to rely on the testimony that I've heard at this hearing?

MR. ESCOBAR: Well, Your Honor, he started off obviously by claiming that he was the investigator that investigated this case. That gives me the ability to actually examine him on

that investigation, not just the fact that they decided to introduce two tapes in this particular case, because that's the basis of my evidence, to show that the evidence that he put forth in the affidavit, the evidence that he's put forth here is not all the evidence.

So at the very least under the doctrine of completeness, I'm entitled to question his tactics in his investigation and other important information that he has that I can tell the Court that I'm going to get out.

THE COURT: That would probably be why I overruled all of Mr. Garcia's objections, but that doesn't answer my question. Why does it matter what's written in the affidavit at this point? That was where we were going and you've veered off to something I've already sustained on your behalf.

MR. ESCOBAR: Because that was introduced, Your Honor, in the initial hearing; that was ruled upon in the initial hearing. And if -- I know you read my motion. My motion attacks that particular information as the basis for probable cause. And it attacks the basis of the degree of proof that the government is

seeking here to hold my client without bond.

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THE COURT: I understand, but I'm not an appellate body. I'm not ruling on what Judge Tepper ruled on. And what Judge Tepper ruled on is not binding on me. I'm pretty sure you don't want it to be binding on me. You want me to make an independent decision.

To that end, my independent decision is based on what I hear today and last Wednesday. It's not based on what Judge Tepper did.

So if Judge Tepper was incorrect as you alleged in your motion, what difference does it make today? Why should I hear this because of that?

Because that evidence is MR. ESCOBAR: already part of this case, Your Honor. this Court has every right to reconsider that evidence at any point in time, especially when Judge Tepper said hey, I'm making this ruling without prejudice, without prejudice for you all to revisit these particular issues in a full-blown hearing. And I provided the Court a transcript of Judge Tepper's holding.

THE COURT: I have that and I read it, also.

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MR. ESCOBAR: And she said, "You're right. We need a full-blown hearing on all these particular allegations."

And so the affidavit is part of this case. And just because you don't sit in an appellate position doesn't mean that you can't review not only the testimony and the evidence that was presented at the initial appearance, but also throughout a bond hearing that we're also having at the same time. Because I've attached the previous rulings as well as I'm asking this Court to revisit the issue of bond and their standard of proof.

THE COURT: Well, let me make this clear for you and for the record. I'm not reviewing Judge Tepper's decision. Judge Tepper can reverse Judge Tepper; I can't reverse Judge Tepper. It's her decision, and her decision stands until I make my ruling.

The way the rule is set up, I'm the only judge that's allowed to superimpose his judgment over her previous judgment, but it's not based on what she did. It's not based on what she said; it's not based on how she formed her ruling. And I'm not calling into question

or affirming. I'm not doing any of that.

I'm making an independent judgment based on the extensive testimony I heard on Wednesday, the extensive testimony I'm hearing today, those things that have been introduced in the form of exhibits and that's it. I'm not making my judgment based on anything else.

So if your purpose is to ask him whether the things that are written in the affidavit should, standing alone, constitute probable cause for this to go forward or probable cause for a second-degree murder, or any of the other things that you wrote in your motion, I'm not considering that. That's not my concern today. Solely what I heard on Wednesday, what I heard today, what I see in the form of evidence. That's it.

So I'm going to let you keep going because I believe you're allowed to attack the foundation of the investigation in totality, although I expect that you're going to get to some point on this, at some point, because as Mr. Garcia correctly pointed out, it's not a discovery deposition. It's not my intention to let you go three hours asking about every

aspect of the case. That's not going to 1 2 happen. MR. ESCOBAR: And, Your Honor, I can tell 3 4 you that I'm not. I've got pointed questions 5 concerning particular issues that are of 6 importance to us. 7 THE COURT: Okay. Then go -- proceed. 8 0 (By Mr. Escobar) Now, with my last 9 question, you certainly did not know, prior to 10 conducting your interviews, as to where Mr. Oulson 11 was specifically sitting, correct? (12 Α He was sitting -- that's correct. I knew 13 that he was sitting in front of Mr. Reeves. 14 Okay. But you didn't know exactly where. 15 No, sir. Α 16 Okay. If 6:00 comes and, because everybody has asked the same questions three times, we're not done, I'm not going to fret about it. But I'm not going to rush anybody and I'm not going to go past 6:00, because I've made a commitment to the courtroom staff that I will not.

So if you want to ask him everything that we just heard on that 29-minute tape again, I'm not seeing the value of it. You're good at your cross-examination, though, so that's why I've been letting it go even though you've

1 asked, like, nine questions now. But I'm just telling you 9:00 (sic) comes or 6:00 comes, I'm 2 3 not ruling on this. Okay? MR. ESCOBAR: I understand. 4 5 THE COURT: Keep going. (By Mr. Escobar) Part of the reason for 6 0 your interview is that you want to determine whether 7 8 Mr. Reeves' actions are reasonable, correct? That's correct. And so he indicates to you that that first 10 11 tap was "Sir, can you turn your phone off." And he tells you that Mr. Oulson said to him something to 12 the effect of "fuck off" or "fuck you," right? 13 14 MR. GARCIA: Judge, I'm going to object to 15 this line of questioning. The best evidence in this case is the interview which is in 16 evidence. 17 18 MR. ESCOBAR: Judge, they --THE COURT: Overruled. with all of his cross-examination. I'm still hoping he's going to get there sooner.

MR. GARCIA: Well, Judge, if I may, his investigation is on an audiotape which everyone in this courtroom has heard.

THE COURT: I heard it and I listened as closely as I could. Some of it was inaudible. So if he feels that he's got some portion of the inaudible part that he's going to be able to bring out through cross-examination, I'm going to allow it.

Normally, you know that I would move somebody along, especially in a bond hearing; however, you're asking me today to make a finding of proof evident presumption great.

And if I do that, that means that the man will be held without bond until trial, which in a second-degree murder oftentimes can go as long as one or two years down the road.

So to that end, I'm taking every precaution to make sure that your interests are protected and Mr. Escobar, on behalf of his client's interest, are protected.

I understand this is taking longer than anybody anticipated, but the sooner we let him

1 get to it, the sooner we're through it. 2 MR. GARCIA: I understand, Judge. 3 Again, one other point. This is not a 4 discovery deposition and that's -- that is what 5 this is turning into. 6 THE COURT: No, it's a review of the 7 evidence thus provided. GARCIA: Please. 5 THE COURT: -- computer technician? 6 understand. 7 (Pause in proceedings.) 8 THE COURT: Ready? Yep. 9 (Thereupon, the audiotape was played and the 10 transcription thereof is presented in the following 11 Italicized font.) 12 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: It is January 13th, It's 1605 hours. I'm with Nicole Oulson 13 2014. 14 at St. Joseph's Hospital in the emergency room. 15 I'm going to be conducting an interview 16 reference Case Number -- what's that case number, 14 -- Case Number 14-1529. 17 18 Okay. Please tell me everything that you 19 can remember about what happened today. 20 MRS. OULSON: Okay. My name's 21 Nicole Oulson. I went to the movies with my 22 husband, Chad Oulson, and we went to see the Marine movie with Mark Wahlberg, Last Stand --23 24 Lone Survivor. 25 And it started at 1:20 and we got there a

little bit early. And my husband made small talk -- actually, the guy in front of us made some small talk with us and we were getting ready to just watch the previews. The previews had just started.

And the couple -- there was a couple behind us, a guy and I assume a lady that he was sitting next to. And he got rude with my husband and just made some comments about turning off his cell phone. And my husband said, "I definitely will in just a minute, but the previews -- you know, the previews are on."

And the -- my husband didn't turn around or anything. The guy just kept, you know, telling him, you know, shut it off now.

And so the guy said, "Do I need to go get a manager?"

And my husband said, "You can do whatever you need to do. I'm just going to be a minute. I'm not talking." It was just the light on his cell phone that was on. No noise or anything was coming out of it.

And so the guy left, which we assumed was to go get a manager. And when he came back, he was by himself. And my husband had already

ż

turned his phone off and had it put away, so we thought that was the end of it.

But when the guy sat down, he kept saying stuff to my husband about oh, now you put it away, what, are you scared -- I -- I -- I don't even know exactly what the words were. I didn't pay much attention, but I know he definitely said, "Oh, so now you put the phone away."

And my husband, you know, turned around and stood up and just said, "Hey, what is your problem?" And from there I stood up and put my left hand on his chest just trying to tell him, you know, it's not worth it, sit down, watch the movie. And that's when the shot rang out.

And immediately I -- it didn't even register with me. I just saw, like, a spark and saw him go down. And from there I didn't even realize that my finger was shot as well. I was just so worried about him.

Do I need to keep going to explain the after facts?

DETECTIVE LINDSEY: No.

MRS. OULSON: Okay. And from there the quy just sat in his chair. He just kind of

1 leaned back and just sat there. Didn't say 2 anything, didn't try to help, didn't do 3 anything. He just sat there. And as all the 4 chaos was going on, he was just sitting there. 5 And that was pretty much all that happened. 6 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. So had you ever 7 seen this person before? MRS. OULSON: Nope. I've never seen him 8 9 in my life. DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. You don't know 10 who they are? You don't know his name? 11 12 MRS. OULSON: Wouldn't be able to tell 13 you, no. 14 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Can you describe him 15 for me. MRS. OULSON: An older man, kind of 16 heavyset. I want to say grayish, some kind of 17 18 gray hair, but now I mean I --19 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Do you remember --MRS. OULSON: Blue shirt, kind of like a 20 21 light bluish-colored shirt, I believe. Pants, but I don't -- I think maybe -- I don't know 2.2 23 for sure, so I don't want to just assume 24 anything. But I know for sure it was a blue 25 shirt and that he was more of a heavyset,

1 pretty tall -- tall stature. 2 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. 3 MRS. OULSON: But, no, I couldn't tell you 4 any more about him. 5 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Do you remember anything specific about him? Any facial hair 6 7 or tattoos or --MRS. OULSON: No tattoos that I saw. 8 9 don't remember facial hair. I had no interest 10 in the guy. I mean I was -- my back was to him 11 because I was facing the movie, and he was 12 sitting directly behind me and my husband. So other than the second that I turned 13 14 around to have him sit down was really the only 15 time I glanced at him. And even -- and then 16 afterwards -- I mean I saw him just sitting there, but I -- it all happened and it was all 17 18 just chaos, but I didn't make note of anything 19 other than that. DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Do you remember what 20 21 his voice was like? Did he have an accent 22 or --I don't remember an accent, 23 MRS. OULSON: He was just very rude from the beginning, 2.4 25 just belligerent, just, you know --

1 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Was he --MRS. OULSON: My husband was calm and just 2 3 said it will just take, you know, take a 4 minute, I'll turn it off, you know, the movie 5 hasn't even started. And he was just -- just 6 nasty. 7 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. Was he white, 8 black, Hispanic? MRS. OULSON: White. DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. 10 11 MRS. OULSON: And I would say older, probably over 50. 12 13 (Multiple simultaneous conversations ensued.) 14 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: I'm recording an 15 interview real quick, so --16 Okay. How long -- so this started during 17 the previews. 18 MRS. OULSON: Uh-huh. DETECTIVE LINDSEY: How long before he 19 went out -- out the -- left the theater? 20 MRS. OULSON: Less than a minute. I mean 21 22 he said some nasty things to my husband and my husband replied back. And he said, "Well, do I 23 24 need to go get a manager?" So I mean their 25 conversation was probably less than a minute

1 before he was walking down the stairs to what 2 we thought was go get a manager. When he -- when 3 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. he came back, did your husband or him say 4 5 anything aggressive towards each other, like threaten physical violence, anything? Did 6 7 it -- do you remember any conversation going 8 back and forth between them about that? 9 MRS. OULSON: My husband said, "Dude, what's your problem? You know, I wasn't making 10 11 any noise. The movie hasn't even started." 12 And that's all I remember. DETECTIVE LINDSEY: 13 Okav. 14 MRS. OULSON: Yeah. There was -- I mean 15 they were both kind of huffing and puffing. DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Right. 16 MRS. OULSON: But that's all I remember. 17 18 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. When -- when 19 your husband stood up, he just stood up in his 20 chair and turned? 21 MRS. OULSON: Turned around, yeah, just to say, "Hey, Dude, what's your problem?" 22 23 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. 24 MRS. OULSON: Yep. But I mean they were 25 loud voices. You know, they were angry. You

1 could tell. 2 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: They were mad at each other? 3 4 MRS. OULSON: Yeah, they were mad. DETECTIVE LINDSEY: At that point had anybody threatened to hit each other or hurt 6 7 each other? Did he display a weapon or 8 anything like that? 9 MRS. OULSON: No. No. DETECTIVE LINDSEY: No? 10 11 MRS. OULSON: I didn't see any -- well, I 12 didn't see anything. No, I never saw the 13 weapon or anything. 14 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. MRS. OULSON: I just saw the spark and 15 heard the noise and that was it. 16 17 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Did anybody throw 18 punches either direction? 19 MRS. OULSON: Not that I know of, no. DETECTIVE LINDSEY: No? 20 21 MRS. OULSON: No, uh-uh. 22 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. So when you stood up, you -- your husband had -- you stood 23 up because your husband stood up? 24 25 MRS. OULSON: Yeah. I was still watching

the movie because I was just, like, oh, gosh, 1 2 you know, this is embarrassing and I just wanted him to sit back down. So I kind of was 3 still facing forward until the last minute 4 5 when we -- basically when we got shot is when I had just stood up and kind of turned around to 6 7 tell him, you know, just sit down, it's not worth it. 8 9 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. And you got 10 shot in which finger? 11 MRS. OULSON: My ring finger on my left 12 hand. 13 (Multiple simultaneous conversations ensued.) 14 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: All right. So you 15 only stood up. You stood up and you put your 16 left hand on your husband's chest to tell him to sit down? 17 Uh-huh. 18 MRS. OULSON: 19 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: At that point they were still -- all right. When you stood up and 20 21 you looked back at the guy, he was standing or 22 was he sitting? MRS. OULSON: He was sitting. 23 24 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: He was still sitting? 25 MRS. OULSON: Yeah, but I think he was

kind of up -- I think kind of up. Not, like, 2 leaned back that I had described earlier. 3 After all the chaos was going on, he was 4 more -- but he was sitting, yes. 5 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. MRS. OULSON: But more up. 6 7 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: How long did they 8 exchange words when he came back in? I'm 9 saying -- like you said, after about a minute 10 he left. Yeah, again. 11 MRS. But, I mean, 12 13 my husband was standing up. He's a very tall 14 guy. But it seems like at some point 5 either someone described it or I saw it because I remember -- I don't know. I'm so confused. 6 7 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. But at the 8 point of the altercation you didn't see it. MRS. OULSON: I did not see it. I did not 10 see him pull it out and I did not see him shoot 11 it. I just saw the spark and heard the noise. 12 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: How many -- how many 13 gunshots did you hear? 14 MRS. OULSON: One. DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Just one gunshot? 15 16 MRS. OULSON: Just one. 17 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: And the bullet that 18 hit your finger is what hit your husband? 19 MRS. OULSON: I assume so, yeah. 20 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. And what 21 happened immediately after that? Like as soon as the gunshot --22 23 MRS. OULSON: He just fell. He just fell 24 to the floor and I didn't even realize I was 25 hit or anything. He just fell and he just was

1 blank. And we just kind of stood there until 2 people came to help. And I didn't know where 3 he was shot or anything until later on. DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. So you didn't 4 5 see where he got hit or anything like that? 6 MRS. OULSON: I mean later on, yes, I knew 7 it was to the chest --DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. 8 9 MRS. OULSON: -- I did not know at that 10 time --11 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. 12 MRS. OULSON: -- where he got shot or how close the guy -- I mean they had to have been 13 close because the movie seats are close, but I 14 don't know. I don't know. 15 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Do you remember the 16 theater number that you were in? 17 MRS. OULSON: 18 Ten. Number ten? 19 DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Ten. 20 MRS. OULSON: Uh-huh. DETECTIVE LINDSEY: Okay. Okay. 21 *Is there* 22 anything else about it other -- you said 23 after -- after he was shot, that your husband was shot, the person involved just sat in his 24 25 chair.

So let's say probably an 21 hour-and-a-half of that testimony left. 22 It's 12:13, so I'm thinking it's 23 lunchtime. How much time, State, would you want for 24 25 lunch today? Can we be back here and ready by

1:00 if I let you go in the next two minutes? 1 2 MR. GARCIA: Yes, sir. 3 THE COURT: Mr. Escobar, is that sufficient? 4 5 MR. ESCOBAR: Yes, Your Honor. 6 THE COURT: All right. So we're going to 7 break. We're going to come back at 1:00. When we come back at 1:00, State, you'll 8 9 have your last anticipated witness. 10 MR. GARCIA: Yes, sir. 11 THE COURT: I know this doesn't happen 12 very often in a bond hearing, but this isn't 13 the average bond hearing. You going to have 14 any rebuttal witnesses? 15 MR. ESCOBAR: Judge, I'd like Detective 16 Proctor to be kept because I'm going to be calling him again in rebuttal. 17 18 THE COURT: Okay. So how much time do you 19 anticipate that you would want Detective Proctor available for? 20 21 MR. ESCOBAR: Your Honor, we may be able 22 to stipulate to the introduction of a certain 23 piece of evidence and I won't even call him at 24 all. But if we can approach --25 THE COURT: Why don't you have a chat,

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then, during the break about that. So let's -let's think, if he gets called you're talking
15, 20 minutes?

MR. ESCOBAR: Yeah, that's it.

THE COURT: All right. So that means I've got approximately two hours of testimony left. That means that I would be then proceeding to hear closing arguments in the bond hearing or do you want -- do you want Ms. Oulson to make her statement beforehand, because that's going to be up to the State.

Have you had a chance to talk to her about that since we -- why don't you let me -- why don't you let me know after lunch. That way she doesn't have to -- and State, you understand what I'm saying and you're going to be able to explain it to Ms. Oulson.

If she decides that she wants to make a statement for purposes of the bond hearing, because of the confrontation clause,

Mr. Escobar gets to ask her questions. If she wants to make a statement just to make a statement to the Court, she can do that; however, it would be after I made my decision.

So if -- you know, it's entirely up to

1 I don't have a problem with it either 2 way. All right. So we'll hear that after we 3 get back. So it looks like we are on track to finish 4 5 by 6:00. How much time would you anticipate 6 you're going to need for your closing argument 7 in the bond hearing, Mr. Garcia? 8 MR. GARCIA: Judge, I would anticipate 45 9 minutes to -- probably 45 minutes to an hour. 10 THE COURT: Forty-five minutes for your 11 closing argument in the bond hearing? MR. GARCIA: 12 Yes. 13 THE COURT: Okay. Mr. Escobar --14 MR. GARCIA: Judge --15 THE COURT: -- how much time do you think 16 you're going to need? I know we've heard a lot 17 of stuff, but --18 MR. GARCIA: Well, there's a lot of 19 evidence that the Court needs to consider. 20 THE COURT: And I -- trust me, you've know 21 me for seven years. 22 MR. GARCIA: I know. 23 THE COURT: You know I reviewed all my 24 notes last night and so I've reviewed all the 25 testimony that I heard. I read both of your

briefs already. So please don't feel it's 1 2 necessary to tell me everything that I heard on 3 Wednesday and everything that I heard today again. Please don't feel that's necessary. 4 5 Mr. Escobar, same, how much time? MR. ESCOBAR: Your Honor, I think about 30 6 7 minutes I should be able to get it done. 8 THE COURT: All right. So we'll call it 9 an hour for each side approximately. And that puts us at about 5:00. Actually, this might 10 11 work out. Okay? 12 So great. Then we will back here at 1:00 13 to begin again. 14 MR. ESCOBAR: Your Honor, can we approach, 15 the prosecutor and I, just briefly? 16 THE COURT: Briefly, yes. (Bench conference.) 17 18 THE COURT: What you got? 19 MR. ESCOBAR: As you know, they gave us 20 this voluminous discovery --21 THE COURT: Yeah. MR. ESCOBAR: -- recently. The only thing 22 23 that I want to get in -- and, you know, I can try to do it through Detective Proctor -- is 24 25 the autopsy report.

THE COURT: Okay. MR. ESCOBAR: And that's -- if he stipulates to the autopsy report, that will eliminate me needing Proctor period. THE COURT: All right. Well, why don't y'all think about that. And if you're okay with it, that's fine. If not, you need to let me know and we'll see where we go. All right? MR. GARCIA: Okay. THE COURT: All right. Have a good lunch. (Open court.) THE COURT: You can take him first if you want. Actually, Mr. Michaels, do you need a moment to talk to your client before they take him out or you good? (Recess.)
